
Greetings.







America's Service Commissions (ASC) is the national association of the 52 Governor designated state service commissions, which administer AmeriCorps funds and promote volunteering in their respective states and territories. We are submitting comment to recommend continuing the Iowa Commission on Volunteer Service board as is.

The Iowa Commission on Volunteer Service (also known as Volunteer Iowa) board should continue to operate as is to ensure the continued federal funding of AmeriCorps State programs in Iowa. Elimination of the Iowa Commission on Volunteer Service, as preliminarily recommended, would create an unintentional and devastating impact on the nonprofit community across the state of Iowa.

The Iowa Commission on Volunteer Service is one of 52 similar Governor designated state service commissions across the country. States are required by <u>federal statute</u> to have a state service commission board to receive the formula federal AmeriCorps State funds. Federal statute requires between 15-25 commissioner board members and outlines a list of 10 required members and several optional and ex-officio members. While an Alternative Administrative Entity is an option, it must be approved by the federal government and compliance with the board composition section of federal statute is still required.

Without a state service commission (or Alternative Administrative Entity) board, the state of Iowa will be out of compliance with federal statute required to receive formula AmeriCorps State funds. In May 2023, the Iowa Commission on Volunteer Service <u>announced 21 grants</u> it awarded to new and continuing AmeriCorps State programs totaling \$9.45 million in federal grants and \$4.85 million in Segal Education Awards for a total of \$14.3 million in federal funding, not including the local private matching funds. The elimination of the Iowa Commission on Volunteer Service would result in the loss of not only \$14.3 million in funding to local nonprofits and public entities, but it would also result in the loss of other federal funds administered by the Iowa Commission on Volunteer Service including but not limited to the Volunteer Generation Fund and 9/11 Day of Service grants.

The programs funded by Volunteer Iowa meet a range of critical community needs including but not limited to afterschool programming, tutoring for reading and math, building low-income housing, responding to local disasters, and providing services to refugees. Governor Reynolds, created the time-limited Governor's Council on National Service to provide recommendations to spur interagency agreements between the Iowa Commission on Volunteer Service and other state departments, local organizations, and the private sector.

The Iowa Commission on Volunteer Service has had tremendous bipartisan support for three decades. Governor Reynolds and Lt. 

Our access to this program has had significant economic impacts for our community. Through these service members, 2.2 million dollars worth of food has gone to Iowans instead of being wasted. Without their support we would not have had the capacity to seek new food donations during supply chain disruption, develop our gleaning and local foods program, and train and recruit new volunteers. Our state needs the Iowa Commission on Volunteer Service to continue to support critical economic development and community action throughout the state. Any short term cost savings from eliminating this commission will have far-reaching negative impacts on the health and economic strength of communities across Iowa.

Please retain the Iowa Commission on Volunteer Service board to ensure the continued funding for the more than 20 organizations that rely on AmeriCorps State funding and countless other organizations supported by the commission to meet critical community needs across the state of Iowa.

So while there are funds that need to go into running these programs, I believe the return on investment is huge for the Cedar Valley and for the entire State of Iowa.





Dear Boards and Commissions Review Committee,

I support the general consolidation of overlapping or bloated boards and commissions as the state works to become more efficient and effective.

However, I would like to object most clearly to the proposed elimination of the Iowa Commission on Volunteer Service and related projects like Volunteer Iowa.

You probably will receive several emails with the following prepared statement, but I would like to add my own thoughts to these below. I have direct and regular connection with nonprofits who work tirelessly all year to serve the most vulnerable, but also to improve our communities through the arts and other programs. I am NOT employed by any nonprofit. I work strictly as a volunteer and encourage others to volunteer. I am a recipient of a governor's volunteer award. I am therefore reasonably qualified to speak to this matter.

lowa has one of the highest volunteer rates in the country, and that comes partly from our state government taking volunteerism seriously. To get rid of a state board devoted to volunteerism, to risk the loss of important funds and access to steady Americorps volunteers, and to push the concept of volunteering from the state radar would invariably hurt far more than the nonprofits who need the funding, access, and recognition that could be lost. It could hurt faith-based groups who support nonprofits or who engage in volunteerism. It will hurt the vulnerable. It could reduce volunteerism in the state, which I believe would harm social cohesion and mutual understanding.

I personally think the commission needs to be revised, restaffed, and restarted. But it certainly should NOT be eliminated. I would welcome a chance to share ideas on reforming the commission, if that would have any value, but I mostly want to write to urge you to reconsider getting rid of a valuable part of our state government.

I have volunteered with Iowa Valley Habitat for Humanity (IVHFH) in various capacities since 1998 including six years on their board of directors (two years as president). Since 1992 IVHFH has built more than 150 houses for families who were living in substandard/poverty housing in Johnson, Iowa, Cedar, Louisa, or Washington county. As homeowners these families now pay property taxes and mortgages, just as traditional homeowners do. IVHFH has also renovated dozens of houses. The first 42 houses were built entirely with volunteer labor; the remaining 100+ houses have been built by AmeriCorps personnel and thousands of area volunteers under the supervision of paid professional construction managers.

During my time with IVHFH I have been blessed to work with more than 35 highly qualified and talented AmeriCorps volunteers. Without their efforts IVHFH would be significantly less effective in its mission to eliminate poverty housing in its 5-county service area. Scott Hawes, IVHFH's current executive director, came to IVHFH as an AmeriCorps volunteer and has risen through the ranks to become its leader.

The lowa Commission on Volunteer Service is also responsible for certifying mentoring programs through MENTOR lowa that makes local youth programs eligible for various state and federal funding opportunities. Today more than ever lowa needs more (not less) people to serve as mentors for our youth. I see this need first-hand. For thirty-two years I have served as a big brother. I am currently a big brother to a 12-year-old who has never met his father. Five and a half years ago when I was matched with my little brother via Big Brothers Big Sisters of Johnson County he was an angry young man. Now as a leader at school, at church, and in athletics he is a positive role model for his peers. More than 100 youth in Johnson County are awaiting a mentor (big brother or big sister) because a parent or guardian took the initiative to enroll them in the Big Brother Big Sister program. Hundreds of additional youths have similar needs but have not yet been enrolled into a mentorship program. Please do not let mentorship programs go unfunded.

Thank you for your attention to and consideration of my plea for retention of the Iowa Commission on Volunteer Service.



Hello,

I am writing to provide my written public comment on the report released by the Boards and Commissions Review Committee, specifically the recommendations to eliminate the Iowa Commission on Volunteer Service and to consolidate/merge the Board of Social Work.

First, I would like to say that the general nature of this committee's work and initial report leaves many questions for Iowa citizens about what exactly is being recommended, why, and whether or not meaningful input from the public will be considered. The report that was released contains no details on the proposed changes and gives little time for the public to participate in the hearing, with short notice. Given that some seemingly drastic changes are being proposed, I would have hoped that the group would have taken more time to gather broader input from the public and then provided more detail in the initial report about why each board/commission is recommended for a change and what impact the committee expects that would have. I especially have concerns about the recommendation to eliminate the lowa Commission on Volunteer Service and to merge or consolidate the Board of Social Work.

In a news article that I read about the recommendations made, Kraig Paulsen was guoted as saying that during their review, the committee applied the standards of: "Is it making an impact for lowans and is it doing what it's supposed to do?" After serving in an Iowa AmeriCorps program that was granted federal funding from the Iowa Commission on Volunteer Service and then working as a staff member for that same commission for nearly fourteen years. I can definitively state that the commission has an incredible impact in the state and is exceeding at doing its job, as it is supposed to do it. The Iowa Commission on Volunteer Service is responsible for distributing millions of dollars in federal AmeriCorps funding to local government and nonprofit agencies, who then enroll AmeriCorps members in programs that provide meaningful services to lowans. Organizations such as Habitat for Humanity and Iowa Legal Aid, local governments such as the City of Davenport and City of Dubuque, and educational institutions such as Hawkeye Community College and all three regents institutions operate AmeriCorps programs with funding that comes through the Iowa Commission on Volunteer Service. As a part of these programs, hundreds of lowans receive services from AmeriCorps members, and those members in turn earn an education award that they can use to further their skills. The Iowa Commission on Volunteer Service is regularly recognized as an outstanding commission, and its work is recognized nationally as an example for other states to follow. The commission was one of only a handful of state service commissions to receive

challenge grant funding from the Schultz Family Foundation, for example, and commission staff and board members have been asked to participate in consulting visits at other commissions and present at national training events. The commission's board has a key role in directing the agency's work and the make-up of the board members is clearly outlined in federal law. Iowa must have a commission in order to receive certain AmeriCorps funding, so eliminating the board would eliminate this funding, hurting both the Iowans who want to serve their state by becoming AmeriCorps members and the community members who would benefit from the services provided. I see absolutely no reason to eliminate the Iowa Commission on Volunteer Service and urge you to retain the commission as is.

Secondly, I ask the group to reconsider the recommendation to merge or consolidate the Board of Social Work. I am a licensed social worker in Iowa and therefore subject to oversight by this board. An important part of maintaining professional standards for social workers and other licensed professionals is having a board that can review allegations of improper practice and apply sanctions as needed. It is unclear from the report what other boards are recommended to be consolidated along with the Board of Social Work, but I would urge the committee to think carefully about what the impact of a merged board would mean, both for the individuals asked to serve on the merged board and for the public that counts on these boards to help govern the practice of the professionals who provide them services. Will members of a merged board have the knowledge necessary to review concerns that are brought to them about various professions? And will such a board have a reasonable workload such that members of the public can reasonably participate, and have the time to review materials and prepare for each meeting?

Finally, I would like to address the recommendations the committee provided about removing the "arbitrary" gender requirement and providing compensation for members of "critical" boards and committees. I don't see anything arbitrary about requiring gender balance on state boards and commissions. There are good reasons to ensure that both male and female perspectives are represented on boards and commissions, just as we look for boards to be balanced by political party. When I worked with the Iowa Commission on Volunteer Service, we had trouble recruiting male board members. Clearly men are involved in volunteering and service, but having the gender balance requirement ensured that their perspective was included in our commission board. Gender balance can make a meaningful difference, such as getting male input on how to recruit more male mentors, because having a mentor of the same gender can be very meaningful for young boys. The fact that multiple boards and commissions struggle to meet the gender balance requirement is a sign that it is still needed. Service on boards and commissions can also be a gateway to future public service. We are nowhere near a 50/50 gender balance in our state legislature, maybe once that is the case then a recommendation can be made that we no longer need this requirement.

I do support providing opportunities for commission and board members to be compensated for their time but I would apply different criteria than what I think the committee is proposing. When I worked for the Iowa Commission on Volunteer Service, our commission board wanted to look at its own demographics and understand how they were or were not representing the population of Iowa as a whole. The commission board members completed an anonymous demographic survey and over several years, found that while they were fairly representative of the Iowa population in terms of race/ethnicity, family size, and disability status, the board membership was significantly more educated and wealthier than the average Iowan. Participating in a board or commission that meets during the work day and holds meetings that may last half a day or more is something that many low-income Iowans cannot do. While we could reimburse commissioners for travel costs to and from the meeting, we could not pay

commissioners for their time, and that meant that it was easier for upper income professionals to serve than it was for lower-income individuals who may have had to take time off work in order to participate. Therefore, I think that compensation should be available to any board/commission member under certain income thresholds as a way to make sure that all lowans can serve on boards and commissions, not just those who can afford to do so. That also may mean it is better to keep multiple boards whose work is broken up into smaller categories so that the burden or participation is one that can be reasonably completed by a volunteer on a part-time basis, instead of consolidating multiple boards such that being a board member becomes a full time (unpaid) responsibility.

Thank you for considering these written comments. I would love to speak publicly at the hearing but unfortunately I am unable to take time off from my job in order to be there. Should any clarifications to my comments be needed, I have included my contact information below.

We have become a safe, inclusive space for all children because of the support Volunteer Iowa provides. To lose this support would be a critical loss for these children and our program.

I am deeply concerned with the recommendation that the Congenital and Inherited Disorders Advisory Committee be consolidated or merged. As a long-term, volunteer member of this advisory committee, I can attest to the high level of workload this committee currently faces, which will only continue to grow rapidly in the next few years. Consolidating or merging this committee would decrease this committee's ability to make decisions and recommendations in a timely manner and to be a place to hear and address the concerns of parents and families in lowa.

Specifically, this committee 1) listens to families and patients about their health care needs and concerns and seeks to identify effective, meaningful, and cost-effective solutions to support their health and to protect the health of families like them in the future, 2) makes decisions about suitable, ethical, and reasonable research activities that will advance the health of individuals with congenital and inherited disorders in Iowa, and 3) makes decisions about Iowa's Newborn Screening Panel and holds the Newborn Screening Program accountable to the people of Iowa.

Importantly, this committee, and its responsibilities, are written explicitly in Iowa code (641—4.3(136A); https://www.legis.iowa.gov/docs/iac/rule/641.4.3.pdf). Merging or consolidating this committee may require a revision to Iowa code.

In summary, I am opposed to the consolidation or merging of the Congenital and Inherited Disorders Advisory Committee because doing so will decrease parent and family involvement in decision-making, will slow down decision-making processes, and will decrease the state's ability to support the health of its most vulnerable and youngest population.



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
In Henry County, RSVP coordinates a medical transportation program that is vital to members of the community. In fact, two Henry County residents could have potentially passed away in

the past year were it not for this transportation program. The program offers medical transportation to disabled and senior individuals. Many of these individuals are shut ins that have no other family in the area. Some rarely have others checking in on them. This year, we had two separate incidents where a person well known to us had scheduled rides, but when their driver arrived, there was no answer at the door. After checking in with us to ensure the appointments had not been cancelled, we called local law enforcement for a welfare check. In the first incident, the individual was found to be septic, nonresponsive, and near death. Fortunately, she has made a full recovery. In the second incident, a woman with cancer was so weak, she couldn't even get out of bed to answer her phone or her door. The officer was able to get her emergency services and even fed her dog for her (which was her greatest concern).

Henry County RSVP works for the greater good of Henry County by engaging those aged 55 or better in volunteer opportunities that benefit our local youth, families, and seniors. Our volunteers work with our local schools in literacy programs, with our local food pantry, our conservation department, and others.



I write this message in response to the recent news that your committee plans to recommend the elimination of the Iowa Commission on Volunteer Services (Volunteer Iowa). I was both surprised and very concerned to hear this news. I can only think that you have incomplete information regarding both the resources that this organization brings to our state and the multitude of programs it provides in service to the citizens of Iowa.

At Graceland University, we understand the importance of our role as community leaders. Graceland is located in Decatur County. It is a very rural area and is, along with the other counties in the area, the poorest in the state. In communities with scarce resources such as ours, finding ways to link communities to address important needs is a daunting task. During my term as Vice President at Graceland, we discovered Volunteer Iowa and the very able and caring staff has been an important partner ever since, providing tools and access to programs that helped Graceland leverage resources from many sources to provide much needed services in communities in our 5-county area that would not otherwise be available. These include After School and Out of School programs, literacy focused programs for youth that utilize seniors, community service programs, programs that provide mechanisms for seniors to make meaningful contributions through volunteer efforts, and many others. These are programs that, because of leveraged funding, have very little actual budgetary impact on lowa state funding. 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

On behalf of Service Year Alliance, I write to strongly oppose the proposed elimination of the Iowa Commission on Volunteer Service, as recommended by the Board & Commissions Review committee in its August 29, 2023 report.

The Iowa Commission on Volunteer Service is a leader in the field of service and volunteerism as it coordinates programs to engage Iowans in service to meet community challenges. The Commission coordinates volunteer initiatives and recognition, provides leadership and infrastructure through Iowa MENTOR, and is the statewide funder and technical assistance provider for AmeriCorps.

Through its 21 AmeriCorps programs, the Commission is engaging lowans in addressing significant community needs in educational achievement, economic opportunity, environmental protection, and nonprofit capacity building. 

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

Good afternoon,

We are writing today on behalf of the Iowa Council of Foundations (ICoF), a statewide network of 75 Iowa grantmakers, to ask that you please ensure the Iowa Commission on Volunteer Service board continues to operate. The Iowa Commission on Volunteer Service (aka Volunteer Iowa) is preliminarily recommended for elimination, which would have a negative impact on the nonprofit community across the state of Iowa. We believe that Volunteer Iowa creates significant financial and workforce benefits for nonprofits that our state needs both now and in the future. For full disclosure, Volunteer Iowa is a member of our network.

The work of Volunteer lowa directly connects to our mission: to strengthen, guide and grow philanthropy in lowa. We have been witness to the many ways Volunteer lowa and their partners have contributed to growing philanthropy in lowa over the years. A few examples of how these programs strengthen philanthropy and nonprofits in lowa include:

Our organization, along with many ICoF member organizations, has directly benefitted from participating in an AmeriCorps program. The ICoF coordinated a VISTA program in the late 2000s/early 2010s to place VISTAs at community foundations across the state, growing their capacity to raise funds, strategically invest grants, and increase their community leadership capacities.

AmeriCorps support also fueled success in expanding the Campaign for Grade-Level Reading in Iowa. From 2013 – 2021, Iowa expanded from six to 15 Campaign communities, all working to improve reading proficiency of Iowa's children. Greetings! I am the director of the Larned A. Waterman Iowa Nonprofit Resource Center, and I am writing in response to the Subcommittee Recommendations published on August 29, 2023.

As a Center at the University of Iowa, we engage with hundreds of nonprofit organizations each year—including members of the board, staff, and additional stakeholders. We understand the challenges of board structure and performance in service to the purpose of an entity. We have also worked directly with several of the boards and commissions included in this report. Without greater understanding of the criteria used to recommend whether to continue, reorganize, consolidate, or eliminate a board/commission, I did want to express our concern for the potential elimination of the board for the Iowa Commission on Volunteer Service (ICVS).

Our Center has collaborated with ICVS on a multitude of projects and programs since our Center's creation in 2000. This includes co-producing—along with United Ways of Iowa and the Iowa Council of Foundations—the state's largest conference focused on developing the individual, organizational, and inter-organizational capacities of leaders, entities, and networks across Iowa's nonprofit sector. In our Center's work, we see ICVS's tremendous positive impact on volunteerism and community service in terms of both quality and quantity. 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



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Thank you for the opportunity to provide input. My name is Kristie Oliver. I am the Executive Director of the Coalition for Family & Children's Services in Iowa. The Coalition's alliance of agencies provides the safety net to all children and youth with mental health or substance abuse needs, as well as children and youth who have been, or are now, in danger of being abused, neglected, or delinquent.

We advocate for children and families and for the people who provide services to children and families. The Coalition believes in a public/private partnership and works closely and well with the Department of Health and Human Services.

We commend the Governor and the Iowa legislature for reviewing the efficiency and effectiveness of all Iowa's board, commissions and other similar entities creating in Iowa law and making recommendations for the continuation, elimination, consolidation, or reorganization.

However, we are concerned that this process did not include issue experts outside of the Department of Health and Human Services.

Child welfare is asking the question: "Are families better off because HHS is involved?"

I would like you to ask yourself the question: "Are the youth with substance use and mental health needs going to be better off with the Children's Behavioral Health System State Board being consolidated/merged?"

In 2018, Governor Reynolds signed Executive Order Number Two and established the Children's System State Board because there was not a state board dedicated to the children's mental health system. In 2019, the Iowa legislature codified the Children's behavioral health system state board.

That was five years ago, but we know true system change takes at least three to five years. In addition, the pandemic occurred during this five-year period.

According to reports from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, children's emergency room visits for mental health issues increased significantly during the pandemic and continue to be a concern.¹

Did you know?²

- 90% of teenagers who die by suicide suffer from a psychiatric disorder, such as depression, anxiety or substance abuse.
- Suicide is the second-leading cause of death in high school and college students.
- Youth suicide rates are higher in rural areas than in urban areas.

According to a 2020 election eve poll conducted by Lake Research partners, there is tremendous "tripartisan" support for making significant progress on children's issues. This support includes ensuring that the "best interests" of children govern decision making involving them. There was also support in establishing a federal independent Children's Commissioner "to protect and improve the care and well-being of children." ³

What is the responsibility of the members of the Children's Behavioral Health System State Board? The website states: The Children's Behavioral Health System State Board is the single point of responsibility in the implementation and management of a Children's Mental Health System..."

However, in reality, Iowa Code 225C.52 the following duties are described:

- 1. Advise the administrator on the administration of the children's behavioral health system.
- 2. Provide consultation services to agencies regarding the development of administrative rules for the children's behavioral health system.
- 3. Identify behavioral health outcomes and indicators for eligible children with a serious emotional disturbance to promote children living with their own families and in the community.
- 4. Submit a written report on each year. The U.S. Surgeon General Advisory Protecting Youth Mental Health confirmed that mental health challenges were a leading cause of disability and poor life outcomes in young people even before the COVID-pandemic.⁴

The Children's System State Board does not have responsibility for the implementation and/or the management of a Children's Mental Health System.

Since our children and youth do not vote, we want to make sure that the consolidated and merged Children's System State Board does not lead us to have them treated as an afterthought.

The Coalition would like to volunteer to be involved in the strategies of the consolidation/merger of the Children's Behavioral Health System State Board.



Written Public Comment for the Boards & Commissions Review Committee

Submitted by Chaney Yeast, Government Relations Director, Blank Children's Hospital

*Not requesting to speak at the public hearing

Blank Children's Hospital appreciates the complex responsibility Boards and Commission Review Committee had in developing General Findings and Recommendations under the goal of making the state's boards and commissions organizational structure and duties more meaningful, effective, and efficient. Such a review is an important strategic undertaking to ensure government creates opportunities for meaningful citizen engagement to carry out its responsibilities to grow our economy, and to protect and support the people of Iowa. However, an important caveat to this complex review process is to consider "one size does not fit all" when contemplating the future responsibilities of Iowa's boards and commissions, and the expertise required to address the unique needs of children in Iowa.

While it is a cliché to simply say our children are our future, the meaning behind the cliché is extremely accurate. Iowa children are the future of our state. The vast majority of children born and raised in Iowa will remain in or leave temporarily and return to our state. These children are the future leaders, the future workforce, the future taxpayers of Iowa. Investing intentional time and consideration into consistently creating conditions for children to thrive by addressing the unique health, developmental, social and educational needs of infants, children and adolescents will in turn generate greater prosperity for the future of our state.

Under the current Boards & Commission Review Committees' reorganization recommendations, almost all of the youth-related advisory boards, commissions, and councils specifically designed to advise the state government regarding the unique needs of infants,

children and adolescents at different developmental stages, will be rolled into another Board which focuses on multi-age populations. Even with the best intentions, if specific time and focus is not provided to study and respond to the unique needs of children, one cannot not assume this will happen organically within a broader Board structure. There are simply too many competing priorities and fires of the day that will distract the focus away from developmentally appropriate policies and preventive investments in the health, well-being, and education of Iowa's children. Just as an adult-sized shoe doesn't fit a newborn, we cannot assume board decisions made for all Iowans will be specifically tailored to fit the needs of Iowa children without the inclusion of board members with pediatric expertise and decision-making authority concentrated on policy strategies designed for children. Of specific concern, two child-focused boards recommended for consolidation are:

the Hawki Board into the Medical Assistance Advisory Committee (MAAC), and
 2.

the Children's Behavioral Health Board into a Mental Health and Disability Services subcommittee.

Both boards are proposed to roll within the multiple layers of committee structure and ultimately falls under the authority of the Health and Human Services (HHS) Council. Currently, both the Hawki Board and the Children's Behavioral Health Board are responsible with maintaining a specialized lens to address the unique health and behavioral health needs of Iowa's children. The Hawki Board provides guidance to HHS on the development, implementation, and administration of the Children's Health Insurance Program. This health insurance product for uninsured children of working families allows children access to the care they need to be healthy without families having to choose between food, rent or paying for a doctor's appointment for their child. If the Hawki Board is rolled into the Medical Assistance Advisory Committee, priority policy considerations regarding Hawki will always come second to the complexities of the Medicaid program which serves a variety of populations including low-income pregnant women, low-income children and families; the elderly; and persons with disabilities.

Codification of the Children's Behavioral Health Board was a key provision of Governor Reynolds' landmark legislation HF 690 to establish a mental health system in Iowa for kids. While progress in establishing core services for children has occurred in the last four years there is still so much work to accomplish to ensure every child, regardless of where they live in lowa, has access to guality, developmentally appropriate behavioral health services. If the Children's Behavioral Health Board is encompassed within the Mental Health and Disability Services Subcommittee, the unique needs of children will likely always be a secondary priority compared to the creation of adult services like Access Centers, Assertive Community Treatment teams, programs to care for elderly with dementia and veteran mental health services that have consumed the department's focus through various forms of adult mental health service redesign for the past 20+ years. At a time when children's health and mental health are at a critical juncture, it does not make sense to roll the functions of all these boards into a large subcommittee structure which is responsible for a broad mission and lacks the specific board member expertise to address the health, mental health and well-being challenges low children and youth face today and in the future. If the consolidation plan moves forward. Blank Children's Hospital recommends that specific children's health and mental health expertise be mandated additions to the HHS Council to elevate children's health, children's mental health and well-being focus into the decision-making authority of the council.

A second concern is the consolidated board structure proposed does not propose attention be

given to the importance of cross-department collaboration. Children and youth in Iowa are impacted by various state departments, but most visibly and directly are the Department of Health and Human Services and Department of Education. Legislators have recognized the importance of cross-department collaboration by mandating department representation and participation in current Boards and Commissions established in law. It is unclear if the Boards and Commissions Review Committee recommendations will explicitly mandate the participation of other departments on each relevant board. Yet such collaboration is key to ensuring successful outcomes for children. For example, Iowa Workforce Development (IWD) is a critical partner to developing programs to train, recruit and retain the health care and mental health care workforce in Iowa, and should be intricately involved with the HHS Council and relevant subcommittee efforts. Yet it is unclear if that will be an explicit priority identified in the Boards and Commissions Review Committee's recommendations or future legislation codifying the new boards and commission structure. Likewise, the same is true for the need of collaboration between the Department of Education and IWD to develop, recruit and retain quality teachers, school personnel and school administrators to educate Iowa's children.

One strategy to promote cross-department collaboration to strengthen health and education outcomes for children utilized by our neighbors in Wisconsin was the creation of the Office of Children's Health & Well-Being. Under Governor Scott Walker, the small office of three personnel was created for the purpose of promoting cross-department collaboration, connecting programs, aligning policies and funding streams to more efficiently and effectively address the root causes of adversity which negatively impact child health, well-being, and future educational success. Blank Children's Hospital recommends Governor Reynolds create a similar role to highlight the importance of child health and well-being to Iowa's future economic prosperity. Through the development of a Children's Policy Advisor position within the Governor's Office, the Governor and her Cabinet will better be able to identify and facilitate cross-department collaborative opportunities to improve health and education outcomes for children in Iowa.

Thank you for your time and consideration of these recommendations to ensure the unique needs of children continue to be prioritized and addressed by our future state government Boards and Commissions structure. To whom it may concern,

I am unable to attend or watch the Sept 6 Public Comments event so here is my letter.

Since moving to lowa in 2007 at the age of 48 years old, I have become active in trying to advocate for deaf and hard of hearing lowans because in other states I have seen deaf people accommodated, given equal access and heard from through the different parts of the state government. Of the last 6 states, I lived in as a Deaf person, I have told people lowa's status for Deaf people is the worse. I could cite examples of different kinds of services that need to improve in working for and accommodating Deaf people equally - whether it is the courts, prisons, law enforcement, education, public health, at the Capitol, etc. lowa's Commission of the Deaf is hardly heard from and their effort to improve has often fallen short.

After a few years living in Iowa, I joined at least one advisory group and also was appointed to serve two terms on the Deaf Services Commission of Iowa (DSCI), because I saw the need to help my peers. I meet former Iowans who moved out of state citing the sad fact that they being college graduates or professionals, in some field of serving others, do not feel they are treated as equal persons, and do not find employment opportunities due to being deaf.

Even while serving my second term on the Deaf Services Commission of Iowa, I submitted a resignation letter because I had a few suggestions to improve that was not carried through because the committee at one time had more non-Deaf people and was underrepresented. The chair was Deaf but felt she had to be neutral. The agency director did not agree with me and others who raised concerns. Thus we could not push for improvements like, for example in Washington State, where commission concerns were immediately shared directly with whom it involved (e.i., public schools, hospitals, public services, etc.). Unlike Iowan Blind citizens, who have their own Department with direct access to the governor executive team, deaf and hard of hearing people are in a mixed commission with hearing people, and have to push our voice or input up the several levels through a group of different Community Advocacy Services , then if we are successful we bring it up to the Human Rights Commission. We are three steps down from where Blind people advocate for their rights-- while the number of deaf/hard of hearing lowans was at least three times larger than the Blind/Sight impaired lowans (I compiled facts about this 6 years ago). Iowa in helping the blind lowans include a good number of state employees working for their behalf and we hardly have one person representing us!

I could cite different examples that I experienced in Iowa that Deaf people do not experience in other states, but we made some improvements and have a long way to go. Deaf people will be left behind and left at the mercy of the state's welfare if they are treated less than equal as persons and their concerns are not listened to. We have been underestimated in number, ignored or overlooked, or looked at as completely disabled and unworthy citizens. Even the words from Scripture is still true today when it states: "Do not insult the deaf or cause the blind to stumble. You must fear your God; I am the LORD." Leviticus 19:14.

Please leave and respect the commission/boards: Deaf Service Commission of Iowa and the Iowa Board of Sign Language Interpreters and Transliterators (Licensure). Better yet, please begin discussions on how deaf, hard of hearing and deaf-blind people will have their grievances heard, accommodations improved and be treated as their fellow Iowan citizens. Minority groups or commissions for people of disabilities rarely include Deaf people because we are a minority with linguistic oppression. There needs to be a way where their voices are not overtaken by other groups or overshadowed because they have to start way down the state departmental level and have no deaf government representative hired to address their rights.

Thank you for letting me and my peers bring this to your attention. We want to work together and bring common good, and exercise our constitutional rights.



This proposal, as part of the state government reorganization plan signed into law earlier this year, could have serious consequences for our communities and organizations across the state.

This could have a detrimental impact on local organizations that rely on this funding to serve our communities effectively.

I urge you to reconsider this proposal and its potential repercussions on our state. Volunteer lowa has enjoyed strong bipartisan support and has been a valuable asset to our community programs. It serves as a vital bridge between federal resources and local organizations, ensuring that our communities receive the support they need.

I respectfully request that you take the concerns of Volunteer lowa board members, grant recipients, and community advocates into account. I also encourage you to explore alternative solutions that preserve the commission's essential role in supporting our communities.

The lowa Commission on Volunteer Service (aka Volunteer lowa) is preliminarily recommended for elimination which would create an unintentional and devastating impact on the nonprofit community across the state of lowa. The programs funded by Volunteer lowa meet a range of critical community needs including but not limited to afterschool programming, tutoring for reading and math, building low-income housing, responding to local disasters, and providing services to refugees. These programs reach every county in the state. Please retain the lowa Commission on Volunteer Service board to ensure the continued funding for the more than 20 organizations that rely on AmeriCorps State funding and countless other organizations supported by the commission to meet critical community needs across the state of lowa.

Without a commission board, the state of Iowa will not be in compliance with federal statute required to receive its formula AmeriCorps State funding. In May 2023, the Iowa Commission on Volunteer Service announced 21 grants it awarded to new and continuing AmeriCorps State programs in Iowa totaling \$9.45 million in federal grants and \$4.85 million in Segal Education Awards for a total of \$14.3 million in federal funding, not including the local private matching

funds. The elimination of the Iowa Commission on Volunteer Service would result in the loss of not only \$14.3 million in funding to local nonprofits and public entities, it would also result in the loss of other federal funds administered by the Iowa Commission on Volunteer Service including but not limited to the Volunteer Generation Fund and 9/11 Day of Service grant, VISTA and RSVP. The Commission is also responsible for certifying mentoring programs through MENTOR Iowa that makes local youth programs eligible for various state and federal funding opportunities.

Dear Governor Reynolds & the Board & Commissions Review Committee:

After reviewing the preliminary recommendations made by the Boards & Commissions Review Committee tasked with streamlining the Boards and Commissions for the State of Iowa, the Iowa Community Action Network is disappointed that the Committee would recommend the elimination of the Community Action Agency Commission, particularly with no context or reasoning to accompany the recommendation.

It is the Community Action Network's position that the elimination of this Commission takes the public further away from the work of Community Action - which is not in the best interest of individuals and families experiencing low income. We need and want lowans to know what is happening with the work that we do and provide input - it is in fact central to our mission and part of our founding principles. We believe that having this representation at the State level helps hold State Government **and** Community Action Agencies accountable and is a key component to the success of Community Action programming. Most importantly, the citizen voices of low-income families should retain their seat at the table in order to be part of decision making that affects them.

In the interest of the Governor's intentions for making State Government more streamlined, the Network would propose the following efficiency: to fold the existing Family Development and Self-Sufficiency (FaDSS) Council under the Community Action Agency Commission. Of the providers who offer FaDSS programming, Thirteen (13) of the Fifteen (15) are Community Action Agencies. In fact, the FaDSS program was born out of pilot programming in the Community Action Network. The mission of FaDSS and Community Action are in lock-step and most families who are utilizing FaDSS Services are also accessing other services provided by Community Action Agencies. We believe the Community Action Agency Commission and the FaDSS Council would benefit from the expertise and diversity that exists on the Council and Commission today.

The Network of Community Action Agencies served over 290,000 Iowa households experiencing low income last year. Iowa is recognized nationally for its effective administration of Community Action Agency run programs such as Weatherization, LIHEAP and CSBG. This is in



large part due to the tri-partite board structure (equal representation from public, private and low-income constituencies) that is utilized at each agency and by the Commission.

By eliminating the Community Action Agency Commission, you are eliminating citizen voices: their experience, their advocacy and the accountability they bring to State Government and the programs and agencies that serve them.

We welcome the opportunity to discuss this further with the Governor, any of her staff or the Committee.

As you can imagine, Deaf people's experience in navigating school, employment, and access to government is different than it is for people who can hear and speak. DSCI and other Commission for the Deaf around the country are positioned to understand that experience and work to break down barriers and create access. Most of the time, the barriers that exist are not intentionally placed, but simply oversights due to it not occurring to people to think in terms of access for Deaf people. That's what DSCI does. Why lose that talent and dedication? Keeping an active DSCI is an easy, cost effective way for the State of Iowa to demonstrate that it values its Deaf citizens and wants them to have a voice at the table.

Salutations, Boards and commissions review committee-

I am writing to you as an ally of the Deaf community, I was raised with two Deaf parents in Ankeny and am now a licensed Sign Language Interpreter. I was born and raised in Iowa, went to Ankeny High School and graduated from DMACC and then left the state for a decade and have recently returned to Iowa earlier this year. Since my return I have noticed big changes that have happened that's left Iowa severely lacking in its support for this underrepresented community in comparison to other states I've lived and worked in. Being a Deaf or Hard of Hearing person in the state of Iowa is an incredibly isolating life and I refuse to believe that the state government wants this quality of life for Iowans. The decisions being proposed makes me feel like we are pushing members of a marginalized community out of our beautiful state due to a lack of access and support.

DSCI was once a fully functioning commission with a mission providing support to the community in such a robust capacity. The current Office of Deaf Services ceases to have any full time staff and the '1/3 FTE' person knows no American Sign Language and cannot provide the advocacy or education that this office needs.

I am deeply concerned about the proposed merging of DSCI as well as reorganization of the Board of Sign Language Interpreters and Transliterators in addition to a few other proposed mergers impacting the Deaf, Hard of Hearing and Deafblind community.

There are dire concerns for our Deaf and Hard of Hearing lowans as they are already feeling cut off from support, resources and services. Proposing that we have one person representing the perspective of Deaf/Hard of Hearing lowans across the state is a severe detriment and loss to the community. One person cannot represent the perspective or support all of the needs within the community. If you look at other states they are well staffed with commissioners who are Deaf and ASL fluent forming a variety of perspectives.

I envision a barrier free Iowa. I have seen my parents work so hard fighting for their rights to access on a daily basis. They are having to continuously educate and advocate for themselves literally everywhere they go. I have witnessed Iowa hospitals, education systems, financial institutions and other systems that people rely on to function in society deny my parents access to communition and disregard their needs and rights to access. Its a battle just to ask a

restaurant/bar to turn on captioning on a single TV when we go out to watch a game.

DSCI is a vessel of support to help connect people to resources and services with the intent to improve communication access while raising awareness and education. I plead with my State government to please support DSCI to ensure that Deaf Iowans, taxpayers like my parents who have worked in Iowa their entire life, don't get left behind or feel further isolated by the state they call home. I urge you to keep DSCI intact with active and involved commissioners so the diverse perspectives of the Deaf community can be represented and supported by members within that community. Please protect the initiatives of DSCI and continue supporting the voice of Iowa's Deaf community.

Dear Members of the Boards and Commission Review Committee,

I am writing in response to the Committee's recommendations to make changes to lowa's standing boards and commissions, shared with the public early last week. I want to express concerns with some of the recommendations released.

United Ways of Iowa is a membership organization, representing local United Ways across Iowa. Together, our members raise nearly \$60 Million annually to strengthen Iowa communities through investments in education, financial stability, health, and crisis services.

We are fortunate to be a partner with the Iowa Commission on Volunteer Services to implement Reading Corps, an evidence-based and effective AmeriCorps program working directly with early learners in the school setting. A recommendation for consideration is the elimination of the Iowa Commission on Volunteer Services. This would be detrimental to not only this important reading program provided to Iowa's early learners, but the numerous AmeriCorps programs designed to meet critical community needs while serving Iowans in all 99 counties.

The creation and continuation of the Iowa Commission on Volunteer Services is a requirement by federal statute to receive AmeriCorps funds. The elimination of this Commission will jeopardize current and future federal funding, impacting, not only the lives of Iowans served by these programs, but those committed to providing volunteer service, as well as the nonprofit communities providing support for AmeriCorps programs.

In reviewing the impact of this decision in terms of numbers, this includes:

******* 21 grants to new and continuing AmeriCorps programs in Iowa;

- ******* \$9.45 million in federal grants;
- ******* \$4.85 million in Segal Education Awards;
- ******* TOTAL Federal Funding in Jeopardy: \$14.3 million

The elimination of the Iowa Commission on Volunteer Services is just one area of concern we would like to highlight. In reviewing the list of boards and commissions scheduled for elimination, a concern arose with the elimination of the Early Childhood Stakeholders Alliance and the potential to jeopardize early childhood federal funds. The Alliance is designated to serve as the state's advisory council, a requirement under the federal Improving Head Start for School Readiness Act of 2007.

There are a number of other boards and commissions recommended for elimination and

consolidation/merger that could have lasting impacts on lowans. I shared concerns with the lowa Commission on Volunteer Services and the Early Childhood Stakeholders Alliance as two examples that are not just elimination of boards and commissions served by community members to provide input, but rather could have unintended consequences should their eliminations remain as recommendations in the final report.

I can appreciate the importance to align boards and commissions to fulfill their responsibilities. There may be some boards and commissions where further review and determination for change is warranted. It would be recommended to determine a schedule, available with community involvement, if at minimum current members of the boards and commissions, to best determine their future fate. Reviews for the ongoing needs for the various boards and commissions should be common to help alleviate massive restructure, similar to the recommendations in front of us today.

I appreciate your time to share comments about the process for review and look forward to final recommendations set forth by the committee.

In response to the proposal that calls for the elimination of the Iowa Commission on Volunteer Service (ICVS):

I have been managing one of Iowa's AmeriCorps National Service Programs for 34 years. I am very familiar with the inner workings of ICVS as I have served at the liaison between Volunteer Iowa and the Iowa Association of RSVP Directors for several years now, serving as an exofficio commissioner. Over the years I have communicated with many colleagues from across the country and I am convinced that Iowa has the very best Commission on Volunteer Service in the country. With strong leadership and a dedicated staff, ICVS has effectively served as the administrators, advocates, and ambassadors for Iowa's National Service Programs and more importantly, for Iowa's volunteer force.

This Commission provides the state's volunteer management infrastructure with the necessary support needed for all of us to effectively operate Iowa's National Service Programs. From a fiscal standpoint, ICVS directly administers AmeriCorps grants that bring over \$14 million into the state of Iowa and assure that those grants are awarded to organizations who are addressing critical needs for some of Iowa's most vulnerable citizens.



Thank you for the opportunity to provide input. My name is **Executive**. I am the Executive Director of the Coalition for Family & Children's Services in Iowa. The Coalition's alliance of agencies provides the safety net to all children and youth with mental health or substance abuse needs, as well as children and youth who have been, or are now, in danger of being abused, neglected, or delinquent.

We advocate for children and families and for the people who provide services to children and families. The Coalition believes in a public/private partnership and works closely and well with the Department of Health and Human Services.

We commend the Governor and the Iowa legislature for reviewing the efficiency and effectiveness of all Iowa's board, commissions and other similar entities creating in Iowa law and making recommendations for the continuation, elimination, consolidation, or reorganization.

However, we are concerned that this process did not include issue experts outside of the Department of Health and Human Services.

Child welfare is asking the question: "Are families better off because HHS is involved?"

I would like you to ask yourself the question: "Are the youth with substance use and mental health needs going to be better off with the Children's Behavioral Health System State Board being consolidated/merged?"

In 2018, Governor Reynolds signed Executive Order Number Two and established the Children's System State Board because there was not a state board dedicated to the children's mental health system. In 2019, the Iowa legislature codified the Children's behavioral health system state board.

That was five years ago, but we know true system change takes at least three to five years. In addition, the pandemic occurred during this five-year period.

According to reports from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, children's emergency room visits for mental health issues increased significantly during the pandemic and continue to be a concern.¹

Did you know?²

- 90% of teenagers who die by suicide suffer from a psychiatric disorder, such as depression, anxiety or substance abuse.
- Suicide is the second-leading cause of death in high school and college students.
- Youth suicide rates are higher in rural areas than in urban areas.

According to a 2020 election eve poll conducted by Lake Research partners, there is tremendous "tripartisan" support for making significant progress on children's issues. This support includes ensuring that the "best interests" of children govern decision making involving them. There was also support in establishing a federal independent Children's Commissioner "to protect and improve the care and well-being of children." ³

What is the responsibility of the members of the Children's Behavioral Health System State Board? The website states: The Children's Behavioral Health System State Board is the single point of responsibility in the implementation and management of a Children's Mental Health System..."

However, in reality, Iowa Code 225C.52 the following duties are described:

- 1. Advise the administrator on the administration of the children's behavioral health system.
- 2. Provide consultation services to agencies regarding the development of administrative rules for the children's behavioral health system.
- 3. Identify behavioral health outcomes and indicators for eligible children with a serious emotional disturbance to promote children living with their own families and in the community.
- 4. Submit a written report on each year. The U.S. Surgeon General Advisory Protecting Youth Mental Health confirmed that mental health challenges were a leading cause of disability and poor life outcomes in young people even before the COVID-pandemic.⁴

The Children's System State Board does not have responsibility for the implementation and/or the management of a Children's Mental Health System.

Since our children and youth do not vote, we want to make sure that the consolidated and merged Children's System State Board does not lead us to have them treated as an afterthought.

The Coalition would like to volunteer to be involved in the strategies of the consolidation/merger of the Children's Behavioral Health System State Board.

Gentle folk of the Boards and Commissions Review Commission:

The State of Iowa is consolidating some and eliminating other boards and commissions of the state government, for reasons I do not understand. However, we here in Lamoni are concerned about one in particular. The Iowa Commission on Volunteer Service which is one of the commissions targeted to be eliminated. It is funded by the federal government, and is the liaison, if you will, between federal AmeriCorps funding and our own AmeriCorps program here in Lamoni which serves six counties in southern Iowa. It was through this Volunteer Service Commission that the funding came that allowed our AmeriCorps program to hire me as a VISTA in 2015.

I spent that year doing research and writing a grant--along with 3 other experienced grant writers --which was successful in creating the AmeriCorps Youth Launch program and the \$300,000 to support it for three years. Recently this program has been renewed for its third 3-year term.

In Lamoni the program supports the following activities:

- 1. They Alley Kids program
 - a. After school program which includes homework help along with recreational activities
 - b. In-school student assistance

c. A summer camp program in the building, at the swimming pool, at the public library, and often community-service activities.

2. The Dolly Parton reading program for little ones ages 0-5 years, providing a book a month until the child turns five years old at which point they are in kindergarten.

3. AmeriCorps RSVP (Retired Senior Volunteer Program) which engages adults 55 years and older to volunteer their time to children's programs, such as:

- a. reading to pre-schoolers,
- b. being Pen Pals with elementary school children

Members of the Boards and Commissions Review Committee:

The Association of Retired and Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP) Directors provides the following comment to the proposal contained on line 167 of the 11-page spread sheet entitled "Board-Specific Recommendations." That proposal calls for the elimination of the Iowa Commission on Volunteer Service.

As you may know, 42 US Code 12638 requires each state to designate a state commission to receive federal AmeriCorps funds. Without such a commission, Iowa will not be in compliance with federal rules, and thus not be eligible for Segal Education Awards and AmeriCorps State Program grants, which most recently totaled over \$14 million.

Funding for Iowa Retired and Senior Volunteer Programs is allocated and administered by the Iowa Commission of Volunteer Service. The Commission provides the state's volunteer infrastructure with the necessary support needed to effectively operate all of Iowa's National Service Programs.

According to the State of Iowa, each year, approximately 5,000 RSVP volunteers offer over 350,000 hours of service in our state. This volunteer service is valued at nearly \$8 million, based on the Independent Sector's estimated value of \$22.73 per hour of volunteer time in Iowa.

42 US Code 12638 does allow a state to designate an alternative administrative entity to receive the funds under certain conditions. If it is the desire of this Committee to recommend the elimination of the Iowa Commission on Volunteer Service, we strongly encourage you to formally designate an alternative administrative entity.

Mr. Chairman and Members of the Boards & Commissions Review Committee:

Thank you for the opportunity to speak to you on September 6. What follows is a review and extension of my remarks.

I offer the following observations as a member of the Tobacco Use Prevention and Control Commission (Tobacco Commission) and of the College Student Aid Commission (CSAC). I have served on both these commissions for approximately twenty years as an ex-officio non-voting member. Both commissions oversee the implementation and administration of critical state programs to protect the public health (Tobacco) and enhance educational opportunities and workforce development (CSAC). Beyond the functioning of existing programs, members of the commissions provide exceptionally valuable expertise to help guide the development of public policy for the future.

On the Tobacco Commission I have served with medical doctors, pharmacists, academic public health experts, frontline addiction recovery workers, youth service agency administrators, and youth representatives. The youth representation is especially important because the vast majority of tobacco addicts start as teenagers or before. If the state had to hire consultants to provide comparable expertise, it would cost many tens of thousands of dollars each year. Currently we get the profound benefit of such expertise for little more than carfare.

The proposed recommendation for the Tobacco Commission is "Consolidate/Merge." Consolidate with whom? Merge with whom? No detail is provided. No rationale is offered. I have yet to find even a single member of the Tobacco Commission who has been consulted by your Review Committee.

The Tobacco Commission already consults and coordinates with many partner agencies. For the record, the Tobacco Commission by law has (non-voting) representatives from the Drug Policy Coordinator, the Attorney General's office, the Department of Education, and the Department of Health and Human Services and regularly works with the Iowa Alcoholic Beverages Division. It is hard for me to imagine any agency that does a better job at working with other related elements of state government.

It is critical to the health of Iowa and especially of its youth that we not blur the focus on tobacco and tobaccorelated products. Tobacco is and is likely to remain the single biggest preventable cause of death in Iowa and throughout the nation. The challenges of tobacco are dynamic (e.g., vaping), and the Tobacco Commission has shown a ready ability to adapt to new threats. Other public health problems certainly exist, but to bury the mission of the Tobacco Commission in a larger bureaucracy will inevitably cause that mission to lose emphasis in state priorities. That would be a tragic mistake, one with quite literally life and death consequences.

The College Student Aid Commission plays an equally valuable role in the area of education. Statutorily designated members have included presidents of private and community colleges, members of the Board of Regents, students and parents of students, and licensed K-12 teachers and administrators. All of these voices are crucial, and none should be eliminated. In addition, we have had financial management executives to provide guidance on financing of college expenses and related matters. If anything, we need more members, especially from the business community to advise on workforce development issues.

The tentative recommendation for CSAC is "Reorganize/Other Changes." How to reorganize? What other changes? Again, no detail is provided and no rationale offered. Little if any consultation has been done with the board members.

One thing I can tell you for sure is that the CSAC is and has been a highly adaptive and dynamic organization over many years and has been led by highly competent administrators. Its role in student loan administration has changed dramatically in response to major federal policy changes, and it has acted with great foresight in managing and ultimately divesting its student loan portfolio at great financial savings to the state. At the same time CSAC has undertaken the shaping and administration of a variety of workforce development programs, including the Future Ready Iowa initiatives, the Last Dollar Scholarship program, and several Ioan forgiveness and incentive programs designed to secure more health care professionals and teachers for the state, especially in rural areas. Based on its expertise, CSAC

is currently providing critical guidance to the federal government regarding changes in the FAFSA procedure for determining student financial need. All of this is being done on top of administering the Iowa Tuition Grant, National Guard educational financial aid, and a variety of other educational scholarship and grant programs.

CSAC and its governing board have done an outstanding job in its areas of responsibility in higher education. I am very skeptical of any significant—and currently undefined—changes. "If it ain't broke, don't fix it." And it sure ain't broke.

Finally, I must offer some general comments on the current board and commission review process. Let me first acknowledge that the Board & Commission Review Committee has been given a gargantuan task with an impossibly short deadline. The fault for that lies not with you but with those who drafted the mandates in the Legislature. I appreciate your efforts, but the enterprise will of necessity ultimately fall short of what is needed and entails significant risk of great damage to the government and people of Iowa.

I am not opposed to reform. I am sure that there are some boards and commissions that have consistently fallen short of their intended goals and should be dropped and at the same time other boards and commissions that have achieved their specific goals and are no longer needed. Boards and commissions, as well as all other entities of state government, must adapt to the changing needs of the people of Iowa. Many have done that quite well—like the Tobacco Commission and the CSAC—but others may need some reorientation.

That said, the process of reform must proceed far more carefully and judiciously than the current legislative mandate allows. Within the examples given above, and as evidenced by much of the public testimony on September 6, there has been precious little consultation with commission members, staff, and constituency groups with regard to many of the boards and commissions affected. The "Recommendations" listed in the August 29 Subcommittee Recommendations document are often superficial in the extreme, and in no case is any evidence or rationale offered to justify the recommendation. That document provides no basis whatsoever for any legislation.

The superficiality of the analysis so far is no better illustrated than in the case of the Midwestern Higher Education Compact. The recommendation is "Eliminate." Just one problem: the State of Iowa has no power to do that! The Midwestern Higher Education Compact and the Commission it operates are created by an interstate agreement among twelve states in the Midwest region. The Iowa Legislature can't abolish that group without the consent of the other eleven compacting states. The BCRC subcommittee making the recommendation apparently did so little investigation as even to learn that simple fact.

The Boards and Commissions authorized by the Code of Iowa play vital roles in implementing existing public programs and in advising the development of future public policies. They are some of the most important avenues by which residents of our state participate in the self-government of Iowa and express their hopes and desires for public policy. The expertise of the volunteers who serve is often irreplaceable and obtained at a de minimis cost.

Any reform must proceed far more carefully than in the current process. I would humbly suggest that your final report not try to address all 259 of the boards in your laundry list. It would be far more helpful if you could pick out, say, a dozen of the most obvious cases for immediate sunset. (Do we have a Buggy Whip Commission?) Then your report could lay out and recommend to the Legislature a more systematic and judicious review process, picking out groups of, say, 15-20 related boards for review each year over the next decade. To do in-depth reviews of even that many in a year would be a substantial workload for a group such as yours but would result in much more thoughtful and useful recommendations than in the current document.

I recognize that there is a politically advantageous short-term reward for an elected official being able to tout a massive reduction in "bureaucracy" at election time. Good public policy, however, goes in a distinctly different direction. Please choose prudence over politics, pruning over clearcutting.

Federal statute requires states to have a board of commissioners on volunteer service in order to receive formula AmeriCorps State funds. 



Thank you for the opportunity to provide input. My name is **Executive** I am the Executive Director of the Coalition for Family & Children's Services in Iowa. The Coalition's alliance of agencies provides the safety net to all children and youth with mental health or substance abuse needs, as well as children and youth who have been, or are now, in danger of being abused, neglected, or delinquent.

We advocate for children and families and for the people who provide services to children and families. The Coalition believes in a public/private partnership and works closely and well with the Department of Health and Human Services.

We commend the Governor and the Iowa legislature for reviewing the efficiency and effectiveness of all Iowa's board, commissions and other similar entities creating in Iowa law and making recommendations for the continuation, elimination, consolidation, or reorganization.

However, we are concerned that this process did not include issue experts outside of the Department of Health and Human Services.

Child welfare is asking the question: "Are families better off because HHS is involved?"

I would like you to ask yourself the question: "Are the youth with substance use and mental health needs going to be better off with the Children's Behavioral Health System State Board being consolidated/merged?"

In 2018, Governor Reynolds signed Executive Order Number Two and established the Children's System State Board because there was not a state board dedicated to the children's mental health system. In 2019, the Iowa legislature codified the Children's behavioral health system state board.

That was five years ago, but we know true system change takes at least three to five years. In addition, the pandemic occurred during this five-year period.

According to reports from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, children's emergency room visits for mental health issues increased significantly during the pandemic and continue to be a concern.¹

Did you know?²

- 90% of teenagers who die by suicide suffer from a psychiatric disorder, such as depression, anxiety or substance abuse.
- Suicide is the second-leading cause of death in high school and college students.
- Youth suicide rates are higher in rural areas than in urban areas.

There was also support in establishing a federal independent Children's Commissioner "to protect and improve the care and well-being of children." ³

What is the responsibility of the members of the Children's Behavioral Health System State Board? The website states: The Children's Behavioral Health System State Board is the single point of responsibility in the implementation and management of a Children's Mental Health System..."

However, in reality, Iowa Code 225C.52 the following duties are described:

- 1. Advise the administrator on the administration of the children's behavioral health system.
- 2. Provide consultation services to agencies regarding the development of administrative rules for the children's behavioral health system.
- 3. Identify behavioral health outcomes and indicators for eligible children with a serious emotional disturbance to promote children living with their own families and in the community.
- 4. Submit a written report on each year. The U.S. Surgeon General Advisory Protecting Youth Mental Health confirmed that mental health challenges were a leading cause of disability and poor life outcomes in young people even before the COVID-pandemic.⁴

The Children's System State Board does not have responsibility for the implementation and/or the management of a Children's Mental Health System.

Since our children and youth do not vote, we want to make sure that the consolidated and merged Children's System State Board does not lead us to have them treated as an afterthought.

The Coalition would like to volunteer to be involved in the strategies of the consolidation/merger of the Children's Behavioral Health System State Board.



The Iowa Commission on Volunteer Service (aka Volunteer Iowa) is preliminarily recommended for elimination which would create an unintentional and devastating impact on the nonprofit community across the state of Iowa.

Without a commission board, the state of Iowa will not be in compliance with <u>federal statute</u> required to receive its formula AmeriCorps State funding. In May 2023, the Iowa Commission on Volunteer Service <u>announced 21 grants</u> it awarded to new and continuing AmeriCorps State programs in Iowa totaling \$9.45 million in federal grants and \$4.85 million in Segal Education Awards for a total of \$14.3 million in federal funding, not including the local private matching funds. The elimination of the Iowa Commission on Volunteer Service would result in the loss of not only \$14.3 million in funding to local nonprofits and public entities, it would also result in the loss of other federal funds administered by the Iowa Commission on Volunteer Service including but not limited to the Volunteer Generation Fund and 9/11 Day of Service grant, VISTA and RSVP. The Commission is also responsible for certifying mentoring programs through MENTOR Iowa that makes local youth programs eligible for various state and federal funding opportunities.

The programs funded by Volunteer Iowa meet a range of critical community needs including but not limited to afterschool programming, tutoring for reading and math, building low-income housing, responding to local disasters, and providing services to refugees. These programs reach every county in the state.

I am a Green Iowa AmeriCorps site supervisor at Northeast Iowa Community College. I've had the amazing opportunity to partner with the University of Northern Iowa Center for Energy and Environmental Education to host Green Iowa AmeriCorps service members since early 2021. The program has benefited our community college, helping to bring in nearly \$30,000 additional grant funding in just 2.5 years. One of their notable efforts was to secure an Urban Water Quality Initiative grant through Iowa Department of Agriculture Land Stewardship to improve soil and water quality on campus by decreasing stormwater runoff through native prairie plants and trees. Our members have researched and implemented ways of reducing our campus waste, as well as reducing our energy use. Their programming has included contributing to the planning processes at our Dairy and Agriculture Foundation to help reach an industry standard of being carbon neutral. Our members have provided numerous environmental science lessons/activities to all ages and helped strengthen community partnerships that have enriched our campus community. The members have been such an asset to our community college and broader community at large!

As an AmeriCorps alumna (2009-2010), I can attest to what a valuable professional development opportunity this experience was. As a newly minted Luther College graduate, I helped build capacity for more walkable/bikeable communities, as well as helped build a more vibrant local food system in NE Iowa. This experience forever shaped me and helped me chart my future goals and aspirations. AmeriCorps is an incredible opportunity for a gap year, for those just out of college questioning the next step, or someone who is looking to switch careers, etc. The mentorship that comes with being placed at an organization to serve and uplift those inneed, builds life-long skills and character development. These are such important opportunities to help to attract and retain Iowa's talented workforce, many of whom are youth!

Please retain the Iowa Commission on Volunteer Service board to ensure the continued funding for the more than 20 organizations that rely on AmeriCorps State funding and countless other organizations supported by the commission to meet critical community needs across the state of Iowa.

I am writing this letter in support of volunteerism from the local and state level all the way up to national and international levels, and I ask that you please ensure that the Iowa commission on Volunteer Service board continues to operate as is. I have heard that the Iowa Commission on Volunteer Service (aka Volunteer Iowa) is preliminarily recommended for elimination, and I feel that this would be misguided as volunteers provide for local fire fighter and other local emergency management services, they aid for building capacity to help nonprofits to provide for community services for youth; low-income folks that need food, housing, and other assistance; and help assist with wildlife habitat restoration projects, understanding and working to improve water quality, as well as monitoring wildlife populations.

Without a commission board, the state of Iowa will not be in compliance with federal statute required to receive its formula AmeriCorps State funding. In May 2023, the Iowa Commission on Volunteer Service announced 21 grants it awarded to new and continuing AmeriCorps State programs in Iowa totaling \$9.45 million in federal grants and \$4.85 million in Segal Education Awards for a total of \$14.3 million in federal funding, not including the Iocal private matching funds. The elimination of the Iowa Commission on Volunteer Service would result in the Ioss of not only \$14.3 million in funding to Iocal nonprofits and public entities, it would also result in the Ioss of other federal funds administered by the Iowa Commission on Volunteer Service including but not limited to the Volunteer Generation Fund and 9/11 Day of Service grant, VISTA and RSVP. The Commission is also responsible for certifying mentoring programs through MENTOR Iowa that makes local youth programs eligible for various state and federal funding opportunities.

I was born in Pocahontas, Iowa, where I still have many relatives, and went to school and obtained degrees from Kirkwood Community College in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, and Upper Iowa University in Fayette. At Kirkwood, I was involved in multiple community projects with regard to habitat restoration restoring native prairie and restoring wetlands along the Cedar River in Linn County for flood protection, water quality, and wildlife habitat. At Upper Iowa University, I got involved with the Environmental Science club where we picked up litter as part of the State's Roadside Adoption litter cleanup program, vegetative management around the campus and town of Fayette, managing the campus recycling program, and helping with campus prairie restoration. In addition, I also started a Midwinter Bald Eagle survey route along the Turkey River where data contributed to a national monitoring effort and helped with the decision process to delist the species off the Endangered Species list. In 2001 I became one of Iowa's proud recipients of the Governor's Volunteer Award. Also, during my time at Upper Iowa, I helped with a study along the Mississippi River to better understand how nesting Bald Eagles respond to anthropogenic disturbances within a range of distances, and as a volunteer I gained another appreciation award from the Upper Mississippi National Wildlife and Fish Refuge. Even now, I continue as a strong volunteer helping to clean up litter along roadside ditches, public parks and accesses, and in streams and rivers. I help with mussel blitzes to search and identify the presence and abundance of mussels in Iowa rivers, as they help filter water and improve Iowa's water quality, and I help with invasive species removal projects as well.

This represents some of what I've done and continue to do as a volunteer, but I should also mention the training that I and others undertake, such as species identification, training in National Wildland Fire Fighting, which includes Incident Command training where it is possible to become part of crew fighting forest fires around the country, and potentially internationally. And as one develops within firefighting and gains other certifications, one could get asked to participate in other national incident command emergency response and management events. These trainings also provide proper safety and hands-on training and development using various hand and power tools, CPR/First Aid (at the very least), and of course whatever else training volunteers need for projects being asked to do. This is where I have to really question why a state leader, or any leader, would discourage local and national level volunteerism, and the shared cost between local, state, federal and other entities it takes to develop volunteers, especially in terms of emergency response.

Dear Boards and Commissions Review Committee:

At its meeting this past Friday, September 15, the Iowa Council on Homelessness unanimously passed the following statement and recommendation:

We, the Iowa Council on Homelessness, wish to be on record with the Boards & Commissions Review Committee as opposing dissolution of the Iowa Council on Homelessness (ICH)as proposed in the Committee's preliminary "Subcommittee Recommendations," dated August 29 of this year. We strongly believe our work, as the only official body charged with providing counsel to the governor and legislature on policies to address homelessness in Iowa, should continue. Here are just a few reasons that eliminating the ICH is not in the best interest of Iowa, especially those Iowans experiencing or at risk of homelessness and those who now or in the near future will be facing critical need for affordable housing, including those in need of supportive or workforce housing:

• State staffing to address homelessness is limited and spread across multiple agencies. The Council is uniquely constituted in that it includes representatives of state agencies engaged in addressing homelessness. Without the ICH, there would be no forum for coordinating communication and resources, leaving Iowa open to missing opportunities for much-needed federal resources.

• Governance and funding streams for HUD programs in Iowa are currently divided among four different units (Continuums of Care). The Council provides a venue for statewide planning and coordination leading to more efficient and effective use of limited resources.

• The ICH has undergone extensive revision of structure and code in the past 3 years. These changes were designed to streamline the process for action, including expansion and coordination of resources. Eliminating the Council before it has a real chance to demonstrate added value under the new structure does not make sense.

• The ICH creates a platform for individuals with lived experience to engage and be active participants in developing and recommending solutions to addressing homelessness in our state.

• Bimonthly Council meetings are attended not only by the 20 appointed members; typical attendance is usually at least twice that number. Other attendees include homeless service providers and individuals with lived experience, The ICH is unique in its purpose ensuring a regular convening of statewide stakeholders to collaboratively problem solve.

In summary, the Iowa Council on Homelessness is neither redundant nor obsolete. The issues we address and the Iowans we serve have no other discussion forum at a time when needs for safe, affordable housing are increasing rapidly. We therefore respectfully but strongly urge the Boards & Commissions Review Committee to change its recommendation for the Iowa Council on Homeless from "Eliminate" to "Continue."

To the Boards and Commissions Review Committee:

We, as members of the Deaf community (and their allies) in Iowa, are very concerned about the news that all of the individual Commissions within the Community Advocacy and Services of the Iowa Department of Human Rights (now under the Iowa Department of Health and Human Services) are to be merged or

consolidated. This includes, of course, the Deaf Services Commission of Iowa (DSCI). Your recommendations for several other commissions and boards will also impact the Deaf community; we will list those below.

Since the Office of Deaf Services ceased to have any full-time staff (instead being staffed at ¹/₃ of a FTE by a person who was unable to communicate directly with the Deaf community due to knowing no American Sign Language - ASL), the services and representation the community desperately needs has taken an enormous hit.

Prior to the resignation (and death) of longtime director Kathryn Baumann-Reese in 2010, the community was assured of having not only representation but also actual boots on the ground services provided primarily by Deaf staff, or hearing staff who were ASL-fluent. DSCI was a fully-functioning commission with budget and mission oversight. Hundreds of Deaf lowans were provided services and access through the Division of Deaf Services - which was later downgraded to an Office in 2010 during a massive organization of the entire department.

Fast forward to today, where the Commission is the sole representation for this community at the state government level. While the Office of Deaf Services has been functionally vacant for, at minimum, four years, there has been no move to hire a staff person. There has been discussion about cross-agency partnership with Iowa VRS Deaf VR Counselors, prior to the announcement of IVRS and Iowa Workforce Development merging.

However, none of this has come to pass; this, again, leaves DSCI as the sole voice inside state government to advocate for the needs and rights of and access for the Deaf community. The Boards and Commission Review Committee's comments suggested that the duties of the boards and commissions that were being eliminated or merged would be undertaken by staff of their respective connected agencies; without staff in the Office of Deaf Services, this will not happen.

DSCI has struggled to get their commissioners seated; it was only this spring (March 2023) that there was finally a full commission. That commission has been active and involved, creating a detailed strategic plan and work plan for the next five years. Several of the goals included in that strategic plan will be impacted severely by the loss of focus that would come from the consolidation/merger to the larger Human Rights Board. As it stands, the Human Rights Board is currently made up of representatives from each of the Community Advocacy and Services commissions as well as several public members and ex officio members from the Legislature. If this Board, already purporting to represent all of these varied communities, is unable to complete the work that each Commission does (including the 5-year strategic plan for DSCI), then these communities, including the Deaf community, will suffer for it.

As well, several other proposed eliminations, merger/consolidations, and reorganizations have the potential to dramatically impact the community, depending on the action that is taken:

- Board of Sign Language Interpreters and Transliterators reorganize/other changes
- Mental Health and Disability Services Commission consolidate/merge
- Board of Hearing Aid Specialists eliminate
- Iowa Civil Rights Commission consolidate/merge
- Area Education Agency Advisory Group eliminate
- Dual Party Relay Council reorganize/other changes
- Iowa State Civil Rights Commission reorganize/other changes
- Human Rights Board reorganize/other changes

In summary, these changes would significantly impact a community that already is underrepresented in State government, and create additional barriers for Deaf citizens and taxpayers to fully engage and interact with Iowa's government. The interests and perspectives of the Deaf community are best represented and captured by members of that community. It is crucial to have services focused on issues specific to the Deaf community, staffed with Deaf and ASL fluent people. These aforementioned Commissions and Boards, in particular DSCI, are a critical piece of the government to ensure that Deaf Iowans don't get left behind. We urge you to keep DSCI intact so they can carry out their strategic plan initiatives and continue giving voice to Iowa's Deaf community.

The undersigned organizations provide advocacy and support to the Deaf community in various ways; all of them know how critical DSCI is to the continued ability of Deaf Iowans to fully participate in the governance of their state and find success in their life goals.

Concern about the Deaf Community of Iowa

As a friend of the Deaf community in Iowa, I am very concerned about the news that all of the individual Commissions within the Community Advocacy and Services of the Iowa Department of Human Rights (now under the Iowa Department of Health and Human Services) are to be merged or consolidated. This includes, of course, the Deaf Services Commission of Iowa (DSCI). Your recommendations for several other commissions and boards will also impact the Deaf community; we will list those below.

Since the Office of Deaf Services ceased to have any full-time staff (instead being staffed at ½ of a FTE by a person who was unable to communicate directly with the Deaf community due to knowing no American Sign Language - ASL), the services and representation the community desperately needs has taken an enormous hit.

Prior to the resignation (and death) of longtime director Kathryn Baumann-Reese in 2010, the community was assured of having not only representation but also actual boots on the ground services provided primarily by Deaf staff, or hearing staff who were ASL-fluent. DSCI was a fully-functioning commission with budget and mission oversight. Hundreds of Deaf lowans were provided services and access through the Division of Deaf Services - which was later downgraded to an Office in 2010 during a massive organization of the entire department.

Fast forward to today, where the Commission is the sole representation for this community at the state government level. While the Office of Deaf Services has been functionally vacant for, at minimum, four years, there has been no move to hire a staff person. There has been discussion about cross-agency partnership with Iowa VRS Deaf VR Counselors, prior to the announcement of IVRS and Iowa Workforce Development merging.

However, none of this has come to pass; this, again, leaves DSCI as the sole voice inside state government to advocate for the needs and rights of and access for the Deaf community. The Boards and Commission Review Committee's comments suggested that the duties of the boards and commissions that were being eliminated or merged would be undertaken by staff of their respective connected agencies; without staff in the Office of Deaf Services, this will not happen.

DSCI has struggled to get their commissioners seated; it was only this spring (March 2023) that there was finally a full commission. That commission has been active and involved, creating a detailed strategic plan and work plan for the next five years. Several of the goals included in that strategic plan will be impacted severely by the loss of focus that would come from the consolidation/merger to the larger Human Rights Board. As it stands, the Human Rights Board is currently made up of representatives from each of the Community Advocacy and Services commissions as well as several public members and ex officio members from the Legislature. If this Board, already purporting to represent all of these varied communities, is unable to complete the work that each Commission does (including the 5-year strategic plan for DSCI), then these communities, including the Deaf community, will suffer for it.

As well, several other proposed eliminations, merger/consolidations, and reorganizations have the potential to dramatically impact the community, depending on the action that is taken:

Board of Sign Language Interpreters and Transliterators - reorganize/other changes

Mental Health and Disability Services Commission - consolidate/merge

Board of Hearing Aid Specialists - eliminate

Iowa Civil Rights Commission - consolidate/merge

Area Education Agency Advisory Group - eliminate

Dual Party Relay Council - reorganize/other changes

Iowa State Civil Rights Commission - reorganize/other changes

Human Rights Board - reorganize/other changes

In summary, these changes would significantly impact a community that already is underrepresented in State government, and create additional barriers for Deaf citizens and taxpayers to fully engage and interact with lowa's government. The interests and perspectives of the Deaf community are best represented and captured by members of that community. It is crucial to have services focused on issues specific to the Deaf community, staffed with Deaf and ASL fluent people. These aforementioned Commissions and Boards, in particular DSCI, are a critical piece of the government to ensure that Deaf lowans don't get left behind. I urge you to keep DSCI intact so they can carry out their strategic plan initiatives and continue giving voice to lowa's Deaf community.
