



Message from the Director **Dr. Beth Skinner**



Dear Reader,

As you make your way through the pages of this report, my hope is that you come away with a resounding feeling of respect and admiration for the men and woman who make up the lowa Department of Corrections (IDOC). The team that makes this department what it is puts their best foot forward each day so that communities across lowa remain safe, and so that those who need a second chance are given the tools they need to take advantage of it.

We have undoubtedly seen our fair share of challenges and I'm proud of the way this department has faced those challenges head on. It takes integrity, perseverance, and a positive attitude to work in corrections. From my interactions with staff throughout the state, I am confident the IDOC team embodies those qualities.

Over the last year we have worked incredibly hard to make a positive change in the lives of the population we oversee. For the second year in a row, that hard work is paying off. I am proud to report that Iowa's recidivism rate has been reduced once again, thanks to the dedication of IDOC staff inside our institutions and our partners within Community Based Corrections.

Reducing Iowa's recidivism rate is a top priority of the IDOC and we have been laser focused on expanding evidence based practices that promote rehabilitation and reentry. The partnership between the IDOC, Iowa Prison Industries, and the non-profit organization Homes for Iowa is a perfect example of an evidence based program that the Department has expanded over the last two years.

This program gives qualified incarcerated individuals an opportunity to expand their skills and gain apprenticeship certificates in the construction trades by building homes at the Homes for Iowa site in Newton. The homes they help build are then shipped to communities across the state who lack high-quality, affordable housing. A recent study conducted by the Division of Criminal and Juvenile Justice Planning, showed that those who completed an apprenticeship program while incarcerated had a three year recidivism rate of 16.3%, compared to an overall IDOC recidivism rate of 37.0%.

In Fiscal Year 2022, the IDOC has been able to shift its focus back to the things that make us one of the leading corrections organizations in the country. I would like to thank IDOC leadership and staff across the state for their continued efforts and their steadfast dedication to creating opportunities for safer communities.

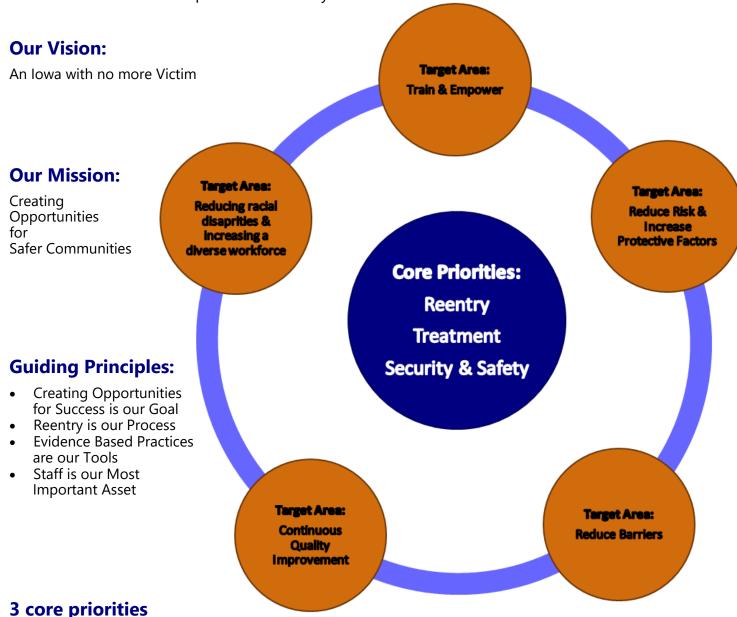
As regular institutional operations began to open back up, IDOC facilities across the state have had the ability to prioritize skill improvement opportunities for the incarcerated population. In particular, the apprenticeship program, in partnership with Iowa Prison Industries (IPI), has seen steady expansion. This innovative program now covers 30 registered occupations with at least 300 active apprentices across the state. By offering skills based opportunities, IDOC is preparing inmates for a successful transition back into their communities.

During this year of transition, the Board has also witnessed an incredible effort by IDOC staff to retain and recruit new team members across the state. Just like all industries, the IDOC has faced considerable adversity as they look to build their workforce. What we've seen as we've traveled the state and visited institutions, is a commitment to finding innovative solutions that address these issues. Whether its facility staff attending job fairs, or utilizing billboards and local radio advertising, IDOC's ongoing efforts have led to improved hiring numbers across the state.

In FY2022 we have seen a Department that has gone back to the basics, which make the IDOC one of the leading correctional agencies in the country. With their continued focus on recruiting and retaining staff, along with improving the lives of the incarcerated population, we are confident the IDOC will continue moving in a positive direction. We are also incredibly appreciative of the hard work and dedication of the men and women that make up the IDOC. Their commitment to public safety and improving lives is unparalleled.

Agency Strategic Plan FY2021—FY2026

The Department has developed a strategic plan that is designed to take lowa from having a good correctional agency to a national leader in how a state can do corrections. It will require focusing on 3 core priorities and 5 target areas. By focusing on these priorities and target areas, the department can accomplish its 5-year goal of creating a 10% increase in the Reentry Success Rate. Not only will the department be accomplishing its mission of making lowa safer, but it will also move lowa from a RSR of 25th in the nation to the top 10 in the country.

Agency Accomplishments — Iowa Corrections

Incarcerated Individual Educational Opportunities

- 1. There were 287 HSED, 252 Literacy and 823 Vocational completions in FY2022
- 2. Post-Secondary Educational Offerings continue to expand.

FY2022 Correctional Education Program Completions

The pandemic and teacher shortages at facilities combined to impact the number of successful educational program completions in FY2022. The DOC is conducting a review of techniques that would take instruction in the prison system to the next level and help incarcerated students to thrive. Teachers are collaborating within facilities and across the state to support and share expertise with one another. Additionally, Department of Education consultants provided updates on new computer base reporting, Title 1, Carl Perkins and Special Education.

Over 90% of incarcerated individuals will return to the community. This makes quality educational opportunities essential to developing job skills while incarcerated that will lead to employment opportunities earning a sustainable living wage upon release. With this in mind, the DOC has piloted technology to educate students about careers through resources and experiences relatable to real life in real time utilizing secure technology to assist with a smooth transition from incarceration to employment.

Post-Secondary Educational Offerings in Correctional Facilities

lowa Consortium for Higher Education in Prison (ICHEP) received funding from the Ascendium Foundation to hire Pathway navigators hosted by community colleges (Des Moines Area Community College (DMACC), Southeastern Community College (SCC), Iowa Western Community College (IWCC), and Iowa Central Community College (ICCC)). These navigators assist students in their academic journey while incarcerated and through release and reentry.

DOC has hired a Post-Secondary Education Coordinator who will work with ICHEP, partner agencies, community colleges and the Pathway Navigators to expand access to post-secondary education for eligible incarcerated individuals.

As part of the Second Chance Pell initiative, the DOC has partnered with four community colleges to offer post-secondary education programs at correctional facilities throughout the state.

- ICCC offers five diploma programs: Culinary Arts, Welding Technology, Supply Chain Management, Baking, and Carpentry.
- SCC offers three programs: Associate of Science, Associate of Art and Associate of Applied Science in Agriculture.
- DMACC offers three programs: Welding Diploma, Building Trades Diploma, and Associate Degree in Liberal Arts.
- IWC offers one program in Industrial Technology Certificate (Manufacturing).

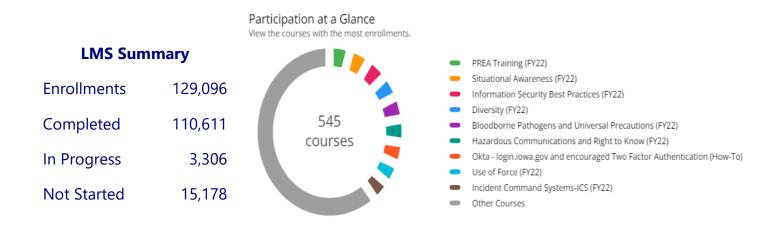

Agency Accomplishments — Iowa Corrections Learning Center Staff Training

- 1. DOC employees successfully completed 110,611 e-Learning and classroom modules in the IDOC's Learning Management System.
- 2. The CQI specialists created and implemented an online DRAOR Institution Training.



Online DRAOR Institution Training

This training is utilized for new case managers who will be conducting the Dynamic Risk Assessment for Offender Re-entry or DRAOR. The DRAOR allows us to identify top criminogenic needs to be addressed and case planned with incarcerated individuals as well as identifies treatment needs. This training additionally is also currently utilized as a booster training for all staff conducting DRAORs.

Staff who complete the training will learn how to appropriately score all sections of the DRAOR, including the Stable, Responsivity, Protective, and Supplemental items. The training provides practice scenarios to reiterate the material and assist in scoring accuracy. Additionally, staff will conduct a final mock DRAOR and receive feedback from the Central Office CQI staff as well as CQI specialists and DRAOR trainers in their respective institutions. Proficiency is ensured before staff are certified to conduct DRAORs.

NET Centralized Training-Two locations

The Learning Center will conduct New Employee Training (NET) for institutions in two centralized locations, one at the Iowa Medical and Classification Center (IMCC) and one at Central Office. This will commence on January 3rd at Central office and both sites will be running by February 2023.

The Learning Center is implementing an updated New Employee Training (NET) curriculum that uses a hybrid, or two phase approach. The first phase is an eLearning with the fundamental information that all IDOC employees need to know. This is done via eLearning in order to promote consistency and fidelity. The second phase is practically applying the skills learned. This provides the instructors and Training Specialists the opportunity to target the instruction to the employee role and specific skill. This also allows for measuring progress, growth, and if necessary, remediation.

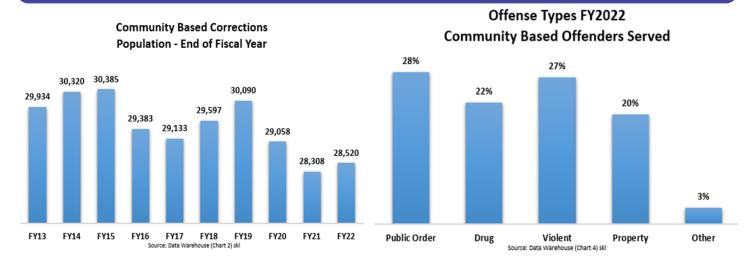

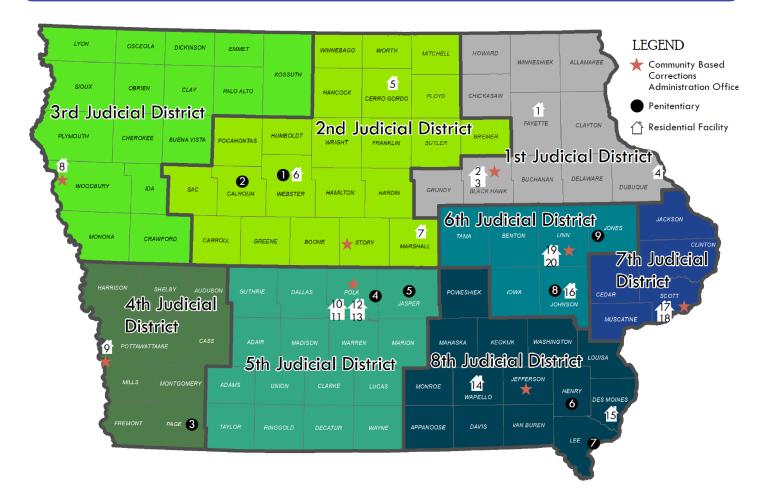

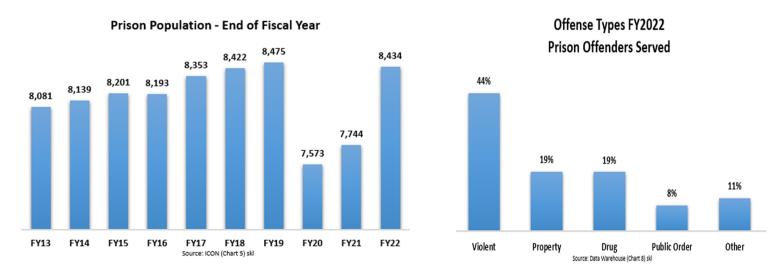

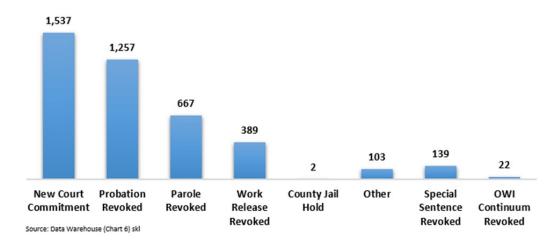

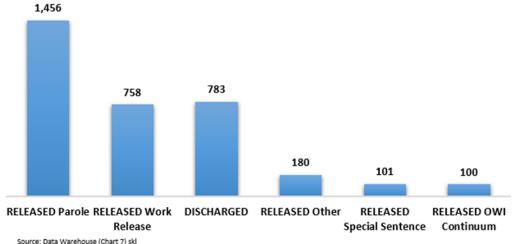
Iowa Prisons Population

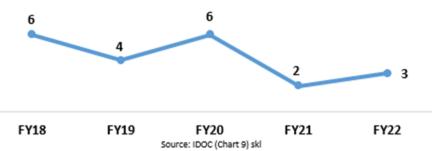

Implementing the Prison Rape Elimination Act (PREA)

Why this is important: It's about offender safety. PREA is a federal statute focused on sexual assault and victimization in juvenile facilities, prisons, jails, lockups, and other detention facilities. The goal of PREA is to prevent, detect, and respond to sexual abuser in detention and correctional facilities.

What we're doing about this: All DOC institutions have completed and passed PREA audits that ensure compliance with PREA Standards. Audits are conducted every three years to ensure compliance.

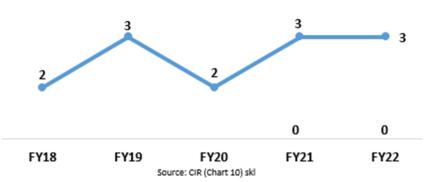


Prison Suicides

Why this is important: It's about providing basic life care for individuals in custody, and intervening effectively to prevent them from harming themselves.

What we're doing about this: Staff training is key to prevention. Recognizing the warning signs of someone contemplating suicide, and intervening in an emergency situation are essential. Staff training goes beyond these basics to include recognition of and effective communication with individuals who have mental health issues. Regular screening for mental illness and provision of appropriate levels of care ranging from acute units to integration within the general inmate population is also important in reducing suicide incidents.

Prison Suicides



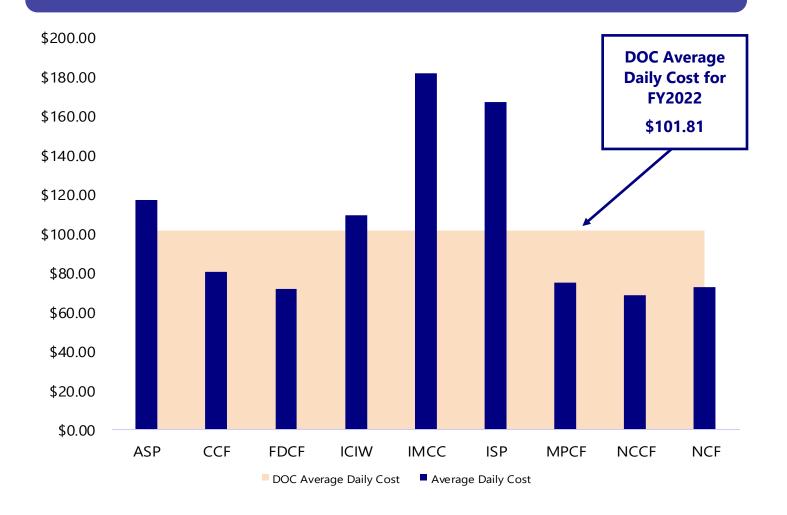
