On behalf of the people of lowa, the lowa Lottery is proud to have generated a record \$101.7 million in proceeds to state causes in Fiscal Year 2021. The efforts of the lowa Lottery team and its retail partners were instrumental in not only clearing the \$100 million annual proceeds benchmark for the first time in history, but, doing so while also safely navigating a global pandemic.

The record proceeds delivered to the people of Iowa were the result of record sales, as the \$400 million annual sales mark was also eclipsed for the first time in the 36-year history of the Iowa Lottery. Driving this sales growth, again, were scratch tickets as the lottery set a record for scratch ticket sales for a seventh consecutive year. Players were also among the big winners, as the Lottery paid a record amount of prizes to lottery players during FY 2021.

The lowa Lottery's commitment to integrity and service to lowans remains the bedrock upon which these financial successes are built. It is a privilege to lead an organization that is exceeding its revenue projections, operating in an efficient and responsible manner on behalf of lowans, and creating entertaining and innovative products that ensure the Lottery can fulfill its promise to lowa.

Thank you to our players, our retail partners, state policymakers, and the lowa Lottery Board and staff for their roles during both a challenging – and rewarding – year of delivering results for our fellow lowans.



Sales Notes

- Sales increased over the previous year in every product category with the exception of Lotto America.
- **Scratch ticket** sales in lowa, which have set records consecutively since FY 2015, did so again in FY 2021 and totaled \$316.9 million, an increase of \$54.5 million from the previous record for that product set last year.
- The jackpots in Mega Millions® and Powerball® simultaneously topped the \$700 million mark for the first time in January, with the Mega Millions prize in particular growing to more than \$1 billion, the second-largest prize in the history of that game. The twin huge prizes generated a corresponding surge in sales in both games: Mega Millions sales trended up 42 percent and Powerball sales were up 19 percent compared to the previous year. The lowa Lottery undertook a number of initiatives in FY 2021 to keep focus on integrity, responsible play and informed choices by its players. The Lottery views these efforts as central to its mission of responsibly providing an entertainment option to lowans and raising proceeds for state causes.

Responsible play is emphasized every day by the Lottery through the information it prints about 1-800-BETS OFF, the statewide helpline of the lowa Gambling Treatment Program, on millions of lottery tickets, brochures, point-of-sale materials and other publications.

There also are now additional tools available at retail locations that can help deliver responsible-play messages to consumers. A "play responsibly" icon has been added to the screens of lottery terminals and self-service kiosks in lowa. By touching the icon, retail personnel or customers can print out a message about the help available in our state for problem gambling.

In addition, each March, the Lottery works with the Iowa Department of Public Health to highlight National Problem Gambling Awareness Month through a statewide public-service campaign. The public-service messages are delivered across a wide array of media platforms with the goal of best reaching consumers in today's fragmented world of information consumption. In March 2021, the Lottery's messages were delivered through broadcast television, cable, radio, outdoor billboards, online streaming services, and social media. In all, more than \$290,000 in in-kind media placements were secured during the March initiative. The hashtag seen during March was #AwarenessPlusAction, emphasizing the way we all can pull together to make a difference.

He Always Dreamed He Would Win

Anton Garrett of Waterloo claimed a \$2 million **Powerball**® prize on a ticket where he chose his own numbers, playing a combination of family birthdays, anniversaries and other significant dates.

"I always dreamed I would win," Garrett said. "It's something I could just see."

Garrett, 48, who works at Tyson Foods in Waterloo as a forklift operator, bought his winning ticket at New Star Liquor, 1625 W. Fourth St. in Waterloo.

Garrett said that he and his wife, Astrid, planned to invest his winnings for retirement and would buy a new home.

Weekend Getaway Leads to 'Lightning' Strike and \$1 Million Win

Karen Kramer of Urbana bought a Mega Millions® ticket while on a weekend getaway to her cabin along the Mississippi River and won a \$1 million prize.

"I saw a '1' with some zeroes," Kramer said. "I didn't think about how many I saw at first, then it hit me."

Convinced that the information on the Lottery's mobile app was wrong, she checked her ticket again - and again.

"I rechecked everything because I thought, 'Well, my phone's wrong.' And it came up again the same," said Kramer, 60, who works as a para-educator in her local school district. "So I went on the website, then I went and checked on Facebook and it said that the winning ticket had been won at Barry's. And I'm going, 'OK, that's me!"

Kramer said she sent a text to her husband, Brad, which initially worried him because he only saw the first sentence: "Lightning struck us." Then he read the rest of her message where she said she went on to say: "On Mega Millions, I won \$1 million! But please don't tell anybody yet."

Kramer bought her lucky ticket at Barry's Mini Mart, 403 W. Chestnut St. in Harpers Ferry, the community in northeast lowa where she and her husband have their cabin.

Kramer said that she and her husband plan to invest the bulk of her winnings for retirement and pay some bills. She also plans to get a dog.



lowa Lottery players won a record \$288.9 million in prizes this fiscal year, an increase of 22 percent over FY 2020.

Lucky For Life®



Deb Perrott of Mount Pleasant won \$25,000 a year for life playing the Lucky For Life game. Perrott, who works at a mail-management company, chose to receive her winnings in annual payments of \$25,000. She said her immediate plans were to take her husband to lunch and she also might do a little traveling, but the bulk of her winnings will make a difference long term for her retirement.



Craig Walker of Bloomfield won a Lucky for Life prize of \$25,000 a year for life.

Walker said he didn't realize he'd won the prize until a few days after the drawing.

He saw on the Lottery's website that somebody in southeast lowa had won, so he checked his numbers online and was thrilled when he realized it was he who had won.

"I had the ticket in my pocket the whole time," he said. "It was pretty exciting when I found out."

Walker said he's earmarked the money for retirement.

Pick 4

Pearce Powers of Des Moines won more than \$90,000 in lottery prizes in **Pick 4** after purchasing tickets using a meaningful number from his childhood.

"This number was an address I lived at when I was a kid on the lake," Powers told Lottery officials. "It was a very nice, peaceful time of my life, and I always play the same number."

Powers, who plans to use his winnings to pay bills, said his lottery win was a bright spot in a difficult year.

"It comes at a good time: This has been a tough year," he said. "It's been difficult, and this is a blessing."



Scratch and InstaPlay Winners

Coletyn Jensen of Council Bluffs has an eye toward paying off student loans, buying a home and investing after he won a \$300,000 top prize playing the **Win Big** game.

"That's the ultimate goal," Jensen said. "Retiring early would be nice, so if I can get a little jump-start on that, that'd be awesome."

Jensen, 27, stopped at a local convenience store after a round of golf to redeem an earlier winning ticket, and decided to put his winnings toward a ticket in the \$30 scratch game.

He scratched the ticket when he returned to his vehicle. When he uncovered a winning symbol, he scratched to reveal the prize. Jensen pulled out his phone and scanned the ticket on the lowa Lottery mobile app to confirm his win.

"I think I'm still in shock and it's been two days," he said. "It's very surreal, pretty much a life-changing moment."

Harold Hinds of Fort Dodge bought three lottery tickets that won successively larger amounts, the last yielding him a \$100,000 prize.

Hinds, 80, won the big prize playing **\$100,000 Mega Crossword**. He stopped for a morning coffee and a scratch ticket. He scratched it later, winning \$10, and returned to the store to redeem his prize and purchase another ticket.

Hinds won \$30 on his second ticket and returned to the store once more.

"Took that one back, put \$20 in my pocket and got another ticket," he said. "Scratched it off, and voilà!"

Hinds said that he and his wife plan to use the winnings on home repairs and possibly a new car.

Scratch Games



Shonda Rogge of Battle Creek plans to begin the search for her dream home after winning a \$300,000 prize playing **Colossal Crossword**.

Rogge, 35, bought her winning ticket while on her lunch break.

After scratching the ticket, she tried to check the size of her prize by scanning the ticket with her lowa Lottery mobile app, but she was out of data on her phone. She asked her uncle, who works with her at a commercial door manufacturer, to download the app and scan the ticket instead.

"And we sat in my truck and screamed, and I cried," she said. "It was great and it still isn't sinking in."

"It does not feel real at all," Rogge said. "I don't know when it will hit me, actually. Maybe when I see some zeroes in the bank?"

InstaPlay



Valencia Kassmeyer of West Point won an Extreme Green Progressive InstaPlay jackpot prize of \$135,902.

It was her second win in a couple of months' time.

"I couldn't believe it that I would have two big wins like that that close together," said Kassmeyer, who claimed a \$100,000 prize about a month earlier. "You see and you read on the Internet about that happening to other people, but you're like, 'Surely this isn't happening to me."

Kassmeyer, 69, said she had planned to buy a Crossword scratch ticket when she entered the store, but saw the increasing Extreme Green jackpot on the lottery screen as she walked to the counter.

"I said, 'Well, just give me one of them instead,'" she recalled. "I said. 'We'll just try that.'"

Kassmeyer said she wasn't sure what she'll do with her winnings, but buying a new couch was at the top of the list.



Otto Samuels of Rose Hill plans to upgrade the spot where he works on his car after winning a \$25,000 lottery prize playing the Cash Spectacular InstaPlay game.

"It's unbelievable," Samuels, 67, told Lottery officials. "I've been out of the service for quite a few years now and it's been rough. This is excellent. It helped out tremendously."

Samuels, an Air Force veteran, waited a day after he purchased the ticket to check it.

"Of course, I couldn't believe it," Samuels said of uncovering one of the game's top prizes. "I went ahead and checked with my friend to see if I really did, to make sure I was coherent."

Samuels said he plans to donate part of his winnings to his church, and use the rest to build a garage "so he doesn't have to work on [his] car in the gravel anymore."

Robert Jellison of Corydon won a progressive jackpot of \$140,792 in the **Extreme Green Progressive InstaPlay** game. He told officials as he claimed his prize that his oldest daughter recently dreamed he'd win \$35,000.

"She said to me yesterday, 'Well, my vision was true, just a little more profitable!" Jellison said with a laugh.

After Jellison, 52, bought his winning ticket, he looked it over a couple of times.

"I kind of looked at it like I always do, and I didn't think I'd won anything," he said. "So I went over and checked it. It showed my jackpot win! I was stunned."

Jellison said that he planned to use some of his winnings to buy a house, and would invest some as well.







Winner Wonderland® Gives Players a Chance at a Cool Quarter-Mil!

Players visited Winner Wonderland for the holiday season – 181 winners shared in the largest Play It Again® holiday prize pool ever with \$640,000 in prizes, including a \$250,000 grand prize.

When players entered a holiday scratch ticket, they automatically received an entry in that ticket's prize category for \$500, \$1,000 or \$5,000. And, if their ticket entry didn't win a prize in any of the first 3 regular drawings, that ticket was automatically entered in the \$250,000 grand prize drawing in January.

To enter, players could Play It Again with any nonwinning holiday scratch ticket from Oct. 5, 2020, until January 5, 2021.

Susan Lafler of lowa City won the \$250,000 grand prize. Lafler received an email from the lowa Lottery's promotions manager about her prize win and said she couldn't believe what she was reading.

"I just thought I won \$1,000. I about dropped the phone when I read it was \$250,000! I was laughing and crying, I was so excited! It was crazy,"Lafler said.

She said she'll likely use her winnings toward a new home.

Summer Heats Up With Chance to Win \$1 Million!

A chance for big cash heated up the summer of 2021 as the Million Dollar \$ummer promotion kicked off on July 12 and ran through Aug. 20.

Players had a chance to Play It Again with any of 15 nonwinning scratch tickets for a chance to win cash prizes of \$5,000, \$10,000, \$20,000, \$30,000 or the grand prize of \$1 million.

The Lottery held special events around the state to showcase the Million Dollar \$ummer promotion. Players who attended minor-league baseball games in Davenport, Cedar Rapids and Des Moines could buy all of the tickets eligible for the promotion at events held before select games. And on Aug. 20, lowa Lottery staff were at the lowa State Fair selling all of its lotto, scratch and InstaPlay products.

Susie Blazek of Delhi won the \$1 million grand prize. She said she was at a local pizza restaurant that evening when she got a call from a friend who said she'd seen Susie's name as the \$1 million winner on the lowa Lottery's website. Blazek said she was so flustered, she asked the waitress at the restaurant to log onto the Lottery's website and see what it said.

"And she looked, and she said, 'Susie, it's true,'" Blazek said. "And then the tears kind of came because I saw how much it was. And then you just kind of go into shock. You can't believe it."

Blazek, 57, said, "I plan on retiring on Oct. 8. And then we want to do some traveling. But most of all, I want to be very careful. I want this to be something I can depend on for the rest of my life."

Prize Zone Continues to Offer Chance to Enter Promotions Every Day

lowa Lottery VIP Club members seem to really like the Prize Zone, an ongoing part of our VIP Club that offers players more ways to win when they buy lottery tickets. VIP Club members can enter nonwinning tickets in designated lowa Lottery games into the Prize Zone all day, every day for a chance to win select prizes tied only to those games.

The Prize Zone sizzled in the summer of 2020 with the Summer Cash Bash promotion offering cash prizes of \$1,000, \$2,000, \$3,000, \$4,000 and \$5,000. Any tickets that didn't win a prize in a drawing for one of those cash amounts were eligible to win the \$100,000

grand prize. The Lottery kept the heat turned up all summer: Every two weeks during the period of July through September 2020, players could choose from a different group of scratch tickets to enter to win the cash prizes.



The Cash Game promotion offered the largest prizes in drawings held in February and March for 10 \$10,000 prizes and a \$100,000 grand prize. Retail Locations Receive New Lottery Terminals



Beginning in May 2021, the lottery's gaming-system vendor, Scientific Games, began installing new point-of-sale terminals to sell lottery tickets at Iowa Lottery retail locations. Staff from the Lottery and Scientific Games were on hand May 11, 2021, at the State Street Hy-Vee in Ankeny as the store became the first lottery retailer in the state to receive a new terminal, known as the Wave VI. The roll-out of new equipment continued across the state through the

Historic Dual Jackpots

Powerball® and Mega Millions® Jackpots Duke It Out in January 2021



The Mega Millions and Powerball jackpots were climbing in mid-January 2021 when this image appeared on the lottery's website.

In January 2021, the Powerball and Mega Millions jackpots simultaneously topped the \$700 million mark for the first time in the games' history.

The Powerball jackpot climbed to \$731.1 million before being won in Maryland on Jan. 20, 2021. The previous Powerball jackpot record had been a \$1.586 billion prize won in California in January 2016.

At about the same time in January, Mega Millions once again exceeded a billion-dollar jackpot, coming in at a whopping \$1.05 billion before being claimed by a four-member lottery club in Michigan in the Jan. 22 drawing. The previous record for a Mega Millions jackpot was a \$1.537 billion prize won in South Carolina in October 2018.

For the first time since January 2016, Iowa Lottery sales exceeded \$50 million in one month - totaling \$54 million in January 2021 - largely due to these huge jackpots.





The Iowa Lottery Gives Back

General Fund: \$1,892,443,179— Since 1992, a majority of Lottery profits have been directed into the state general fund, where they are used to pay for programs that benefit all lowans like education, natural resources, health and family services and public safety. In the lowa Lottery's latest fiscal year, it raised more than \$99 million in proceeds that were deposited in the General Fund. The Governor and lowa Legislature allocate money from the General Fund based on where they believe those funds are needed most.

lowa Plan: \$170,318,439 — The lowa Plan was a long-term economic development program. Lottery profits were dedicated to the Plan from FY 1986 through FY 1990.

CLEAN Fund: \$35,894,355 — The CLEAN Fund stood for Committing the Lottery to Environment, Agriculture and Natural Resources. Lottery profits were dedicated to the Fund during FY 1991.

lowa Veterans Trust Fund \$32,352,121 — Since July 2008, a portion of Lottery proceeds has been dedicated to the lowa Veterans Trust Fund, where they are used to support our state's veterans. The lowa Lottery currently provides \$2.5 million annually in proceeds to the lowa Veterans Trust Fund. The lowa Veterans Trust Fund was created to provide assistance to qualified veterans to help pay for expenses such as job training or college tuition assistance; some dental, vision and hearing assistance; and individual or family counseling programs.


lowa Gambling Treatment Fund: \$15,732,208 — The lowa Gambling Treatment Program provides treatment, counseling and outreach programs for those concerned about gambling as well as the 1-800-BETSOFF helpline. The lowa Lottery

is committed to responsible play and helps address the issue of problem gambling. Each year, the Lottery provides the public with information about 1-800-BETSOFF by including messages about the helpline on millions of lottery tickets, brochures and point-of-sale materials as well as other publications. In 2009, the Gambling Treatment Fund was eliminated, with the Gambling Treatment Program now receiving its funding from the state General Fund.

Special Appropriations: \$13,773,572 — A portion of Lottery profits have been earmarked for specific purposes within the state budget.

lowa Survivor Benefits Funds: \$300,000 — Since 2019, a portion of lottery proceeds has been dedicated to the Public Safety Survivor Benefits Fund to help with the cost of accident or health insurance for the families of lowa peace officers and fire fighters killed in the line of duty. And since 2021, a portion of Lottery proceeds has been dedicated to the Department of Corrections Survivor Benefits Fund to help with those same insurance costs for the families of lowa Corrections employees who die in the line of duty.

New Survivor Benefits Fund Added in 2021



In 2021, a new beneficiary was added to the list of causes that receive a portion of annual lowa Lottery proceeds.

Legislation signed into law on June 8, 2021, created the Department of Corrections Survivor Benefits Fund. It is similar in approach to the Public Safety Survivor Benefits Fund, which was created in 2019.

Through the Benefits Funds, lottery proceeds are used to help with the cost of accident or health insurance for the families of lowa peace officers, fire fighters and corrections employees killed in the line of duty. Under the law, \$100,000 in annual lottery proceeds is dedicated to each fund.

The Survivor Benefits Funds provide grants to nonprofit organizations that help the families pay for the costs of their ongoing insurance coverage.

Overview & Key Results

The lowa Lottery was established in 1985 and began ticket sales on Aug. 22 of that year. Since the Lottery's inception, its players have won more than \$4.9 billion in prizes while the Lottery has raised more than \$2.1 billion for the state programs that benefit all lowans.

The guiding principles of the lowa Lottery are:

- Develop and distribute products that are fun and exciting to lowans;
- Maintain integrity and security in production and delivery of those products while utilizing advanced technology;
- Educate and motivate the public to play Lottery games responsibly;
- Maintain the dignity of the Lottery through truthful, tasteful and informative advertising;
- Develop an effective employee workforce that is professional, knowledgeable, skilled, and offers maximum service and reliability to retailers and players; and
- Responsibly maximize net revenues to the state.

Today, lottery proceeds help our state in multiple ways. They help lowa veterans and their families through the lowa Veterans Trust Fund. They help the families of lowa peace officers, firefighters and corrections employees who die in the line of duty. And they provide help for a variety of significant projects through the state General Fund.

The Lottery has approximately 108 employees in the following departments: administration, external relations, finance, marketing, systems, sales and security. That number does not include the board members.

The Lottery's headquarters office is in Clive, and it maintains a warehouse facility in Ankeny and three regional offices in Cedar Rapids, Mason City and Storm Lake. The lottery has four product categories: scratch tickets, pull-tab tickets, InstaPlay and lotto games. Lottery products are sold through approximately 2,400 licensed retailers across lowa.

In 2003 the Legislature recognized that as an entrepreneurial entity, the lowa Lottery could operate more efficiently and established the lowa Lottery Authority, a public instrumentality of the state. As a result of that change, combined sales for the Lottery's traditional products have continued to climb in the fiscal years since then.

The lowa Lottery develops an annual budget, which requires approval by the Board of Directors. The budget is monitored through a series of performance measures.


The goals and results discussed in this report cover the following core functions of the lowa Lottery's operations: sales and distribution; resource management; and enforcement and investigation.




