A BILL FOR

1 An Act relating to appropriations to the justice system.
2 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

1 Section 1. DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE.

2 1. There is appropriated from the general fund of the state
3 to the department of justice for the fiscal year beginning July
4 1, 2020, and ending June 30, 2021, the following amounts, or
5 so much thereof as is necessary, to be used for the purposes
6 designated:

7 a. For the general office of attorney general for
8 salaries, support, maintenance, and miscellaneous purposes,
9 including the prosecuting attorneys training program, matching
10 funds for federal violence against women grant programs,
11 victim assistance grants, the office of drug control policy
12 prosecuting attorney program, and odometer fraud enforcement:
13 \$ 6,113,631

14 As a condition of receiving the appropriation provided
15 in this lettered paragraph, the department of justice shall
16 maintain a record of the estimated time incurred representing
17 each agency or department.

18 The general office of attorney general may temporarily
19 exceed and draw more than the amount appropriated in this
20 lettered paragraph and incur a negative cash balance as long
21 as there are receivables equal to or greater than the negative
22 balances and the amount appropriated in this lettered paragraph
23 is not exceeded at the close of the fiscal year.

24 b. For victim assistance grants:
25 \$ 5,016,708

26 The moneys appropriated in this lettered paragraph shall be
27 used to provide grants to care providers providing services to
28 crime victims of domestic abuse or to crime victims of rape and
29 sexual assault.

30 The balance of the victim compensation fund established
31 in section 915.94 may be used to provide salary and support
32 of not more than 24.00 full-time equivalent positions and to
33 provide maintenance for the victim compensation functions
34 of the department of justice. In addition to the full-time
35 equivalent positions authorized pursuant to this paragraph,

1 5.00 full-time equivalent positions are authorized and shall
2 be used by the department of justice to employ one accountant
3 and four program planners. The department of justice may
4 employ the additional 5.00 full-time equivalent positions
5 authorized pursuant to this paragraph that are in excess of the
6 number of full-time equivalent positions authorized only if
7 the department of justice receives sufficient federal moneys
8 to maintain employment for the additional full-time equivalent
9 positions during the current fiscal year. The department
10 of justice shall only employ the additional 5.00 full-time
11 equivalent positions in succeeding fiscal years if sufficient
12 federal moneys are received during each of those succeeding
13 fiscal years.

14 The department of justice shall transfer at least \$150,000
15 from the victim compensation fund established in section 915.94
16 to the victim assistance grant program established in section
17 13.31.

18 Notwithstanding section 8.33, moneys appropriated in this
19 lettered paragraph that remain unencumbered or unobligated at
20 the close of the fiscal year shall not revert but shall remain
21 available for expenditure for the purposes designated until the
22 close of the succeeding fiscal year.

23 c. For legal services for persons in poverty grants as
24 provided in section 13.34:

25 \$ 2,634,601

26 2. a. The department of justice, in submitting budget
27 estimates for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2021, pursuant
28 to section 8.23, shall include a report of funding from sources
29 other than amounts appropriated directly from the general fund
30 of the state to the department of justice or to the office of
31 consumer advocate. These funding sources shall include but
32 are not limited to reimbursements from other state agencies,
33 commissions, boards, or similar entities, and reimbursements
34 from special funds or internal accounts within the department
35 of justice. The department of justice shall also report actual

1 reimbursements for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2019,
2 and actual and expected reimbursements for the fiscal year
3 beginning July 1, 2020.

4 b. The department of justice shall include the report
5 required under paragraph "a", as well as information regarding
6 any revisions occurring as a result of reimbursements actually
7 received or expected at a later date, in a report to the
8 co-chairpersons and ranking members of the joint appropriations
9 subcommittee on the justice system and the legislative services
10 agency. The department of justice shall submit the report on
11 or before January 15, 2021.

12 3. a. The department of justice shall fully reimburse
13 the costs and necessary related expenses incurred by the Iowa
14 law enforcement academy to continue to employ one additional
15 instructor position who shall provide training for human
16 trafficking-related issues throughout the state.

17 b. The department of justice shall obtain the moneys
18 necessary to reimburse the Iowa law enforcement academy to
19 employ such an instructor from unrestricted moneys from either
20 the victim compensation fund established in section 915.94, the
21 human trafficking victim fund established in section 915.95, or
22 the human trafficking enforcement fund established in 2015 Iowa
23 Acts, chapter 138, section 141.

24 Sec. 2. OFFICE OF CONSUMER ADVOCATE. There is appropriated
25 from the department of commerce revolving fund created in
26 section 546.12 to the office of consumer advocate of the
27 department of justice for the fiscal year beginning July 1,
28 2020, and ending June 30, 2021, the following amount, or so
29 much thereof as is necessary, to be used for the purposes
30 designated:

31 For salaries, support, maintenance, and miscellaneous
32 purposes:
33 \$ 3,137,588

34 Sec. 3. DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS — FACILITIES.

35 1. There is appropriated from the general fund of the state

1 to the department of corrections for the fiscal year beginning
2 July 1, 2020, and ending June 30, 2021, the following amounts,
3 or so much thereof as is necessary, to be used for the purposes
4 designated:

5 a. For the operation of the Fort Madison correctional
6 facility, including salaries, support, maintenance, and
7 miscellaneous purposes:
8 \$ 42,174,857

9 b. For the operation of the Anamosa correctional facility,
10 including salaries, support, maintenance, and miscellaneous
11 purposes:
12 \$ 33,361,505

13 c. For the operation of the Oakdale correctional facility,
14 including salaries, support, maintenance, and miscellaneous
15 purposes:
16 \$ 63,468,514

17 d. For the operation of the Newton correctional facility,
18 including salaries, support, maintenance, and miscellaneous
19 purposes:
20 \$ 29,231,758

21 e. For the operation of the Mount Pleasant correctional
22 facility, including salaries, support, maintenance, and
23 miscellaneous purposes:
24 \$ 26,534,036

25 f. For the operation of the Rockwell City correctional
26 facility, including salaries, support, maintenance, and
27 miscellaneous purposes:
28 \$ 10,780,652

29 g. For the operation of the Clarinda correctional facility,
30 including salaries, support, maintenance, and miscellaneous
31 purposes:
32 \$ 25,504,023

33 Moneys received by the department of corrections as
34 reimbursement for services provided to the Clarinda youth
35 corporation are appropriated to the department and shall be

1 used for the purpose of operating the Clarinda correctional
2 facility.

3 h. For the operation of the Mitchellville correctional
4 facility, including salaries, support, maintenance, and
5 miscellaneous purposes:

6 \$ 23,841,145

7 i. For the operation of the Fort Dodge correctional
8 facility, including salaries, support, maintenance, and
9 miscellaneous purposes:

10 \$ 30,742,310

11 j. For reimbursement of counties for temporary confinement
12 of prisoners, as provided in sections 901.7, 904.908, and
13 906.17, and for offenders confined pursuant to section 904.513:

14 \$ 1,082,635

15 k. For federal prison reimbursement, reimbursements for
16 out-of-state placements, and miscellaneous contracts:

17 \$ 234,411

18 2. The department of corrections shall use moneys
19 appropriated in subsection 1 to continue to contract for the
20 services of a Muslim imam and a Native American spiritual
21 leader.

22 Sec. 4. DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS — ADMINISTRATION.

23 There is appropriated from the general fund of the state to the
24 department of corrections for the fiscal year beginning July
25 1, 2020, and ending June 30, 2021, the following amounts, or
26 so much thereof as is necessary, to be used for the purposes
27 designated:

28 1. For general administration, including salaries and the
29 adjustment of salaries throughout the department, support,
30 maintenance, employment of an education director to administer
31 a centralized education program for the correctional system,
32 and miscellaneous purposes:

33 \$ 5,651,947

34 a. It is the intent of the general assembly that each
35 lease negotiated by the department of corrections with a

1 private corporation for the purpose of providing private
2 industry employment of inmates in a correctional institution
3 shall prohibit the private corporation from utilizing inmate
4 labor for partisan political purposes for any person seeking
5 election to public office in this state and that a violation
6 of this requirement shall result in a termination of the lease
7 agreement.

8 b. It is the intent of the general assembly that as a
9 condition of receiving the appropriation provided in this
10 subsection the department of corrections shall not enter into
11 a lease or contractual agreement pursuant to section 904.809
12 with a private corporation for the use of building space for
13 the purpose of providing inmate employment without providing
14 that the terms of the lease or contract establish safeguards to
15 restrict, to the greatest extent feasible, access by inmates
16 working for the private corporation to personal identifying
17 information of citizens.

18 2. For educational programs for inmates at state penal
19 institutions:

20 \$ 2,608,109

21 a. To maximize the funding for educational programs,
22 the department shall establish guidelines and procedures to
23 prioritize the availability of educational and vocational
24 training for inmates based upon the goal of facilitating an
25 inmate's successful release from the correctional institution.

26 b. The director of the department of corrections may
27 transfer moneys from Iowa prison industries and the canteen
28 operating funds established pursuant to section 904.310, for
29 use in educational programs for inmates.

30 c. Notwithstanding section 8.33, moneys appropriated in
31 this subsection that remain unencumbered or unobligated at the
32 close of the fiscal year shall not revert but shall remain
33 available to be used only for the purposes designated in this
34 subsection until the close of the succeeding fiscal year.

35 3. For the development and operation of the Iowa corrections

1 offender network (ICON) data system:
2 \$ 2,000,000

3 4. For offender mental health and substance abuse
4 treatment:
5 \$ 28,065

6 Sec. 5. JUDICIAL DISTRICT DEPARTMENTS OF CORRECTIONAL
7 SERVICES.

8 1. There is appropriated from the general fund of the state
9 to the department of corrections for the fiscal year beginning
10 July 1, 2020, and ending June 30, 2021, for salaries, support,
11 maintenance, and miscellaneous purposes, the following amounts,
12 or so much thereof as is necessary, to be used for the purposes
13 designated:

14 a. For the first judicial district department of
15 correctional services:
16 \$ 15,460,786

17 It is the intent of the general assembly that the first
18 judicial district department of correctional services maintains
19 the drug courts operated by the district department.

20 b. For the second judicial district department of
21 correctional services:
22 \$ 11,943,698

23 It is the intent of the general assembly that the second
24 judicial district department of correctional services maintains
25 two drug courts to be operated by the district department.

26 c. For the third judicial district department of
27 correctional services:
28 \$ 7,465,072

29 d. For the fourth judicial district department of
30 correctional services:
31 \$ 5,906,576

32 e. For the fifth judicial district department of
33 correctional services, including funding for electronic
34 monitoring devices for use on a statewide basis:
35 \$ 22,373,416

1 It is the intent of the general assembly that the fifth
2 judicial district department of correctional services maintains
3 the drug court operated by the district department.

4 f. For the sixth judicial district department of
5 correctional services:
6 \$ 15,330,967

7 It is the intent of the general assembly that the sixth
8 judicial district department of correctional services maintains
9 the drug court operated by the district department.

10 g. For the seventh judicial district department of
11 correctional services:
12 \$ 8,157,791

13 It is the intent of the general assembly that the seventh
14 judicial district department of correctional services maintains
15 the drug court operated by the district department.

16 h. For the eighth judicial district department of
17 correctional services:
18 \$ 8,702,390

19 2. There is appropriated from the general fund of the state
20 to the department of corrections for the fiscal year beginning
21 July 1, 2020, and ending June 30, 2021, the following amount,
22 or so much thereof as is necessary, to be used for the purposes
23 designated:

24 For statewide judicial assistance, support, and pilot
25 projects for judicial district departments of correctional
26 services:
27 \$ 640,584

28 3. Each judicial district department of correctional
29 services, within the moneys available, shall continue programs
30 and plans established within that district to provide for
31 intensive supervision, sex offender treatment, diversion of
32 low-risk offenders to the least restrictive sanction available,
33 job development, and expanded use of intermediate criminal
34 sanctions.

35 4. Each judicial district department of correctional

1 services shall provide alternatives to prison consistent with
2 chapter 901B. The alternatives to prison shall ensure public
3 safety while providing maximum rehabilitation to the offender.
4 A judicial district department of correctional services may
5 also establish a day program.

6 5. The governor's office of drug control policy shall
7 consider federal grants made to the department of corrections
8 for the benefit of each of the eight judicial district
9 departments of correctional services as local government
10 grants, as defined pursuant to federal regulations.

11 6. The department of corrections shall continue to contract
12 with a judicial district department of correctional services to
13 provide for the rental of electronic monitoring equipment which
14 shall be available statewide.

15 7. The public safety assessment shall not be utilized
16 in pretrial hearings when determining whether to detain or
17 release a defendant before trial, and the use of the public
18 safety assessment pilot program shall be terminated as of the
19 effective date of this subsection, until such time the use of
20 the public safety assessment has been specifically authorized
21 by the general assembly.

22 Sec. 6. DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS — REALLOCATION OF
23 APPROPRIATIONS. Notwithstanding section 8.39, within
24 the moneys appropriated in this Act to the department of
25 corrections, the department may reallocate the moneys
26 appropriated and allocated as necessary to best fulfill the
27 needs of the correctional institutions, administration of
28 the department, and the judicial district departments of
29 correctional services. However, in addition to complying with
30 the requirements of sections 904.116 and 905.8 and providing
31 notice to the legislative services agency, the department
32 of corrections shall also provide notice to the department
33 of management, prior to the effective date of the revision
34 or reallocation of an appropriation made pursuant to this
35 section. The department of corrections shall not reallocate an

1 appropriation or allocation for the purpose of eliminating any
2 program.

3 Sec. 7. INTENT — REPORTS.

4 1. The department of corrections, in cooperation with
5 townships, the Iowa cemetery associations, and other nonprofit
6 or governmental entities, may use inmate labor during the
7 fiscal year beginning July 1, 2020, to restore or preserve
8 rural cemeteries and historical landmarks. The department, in
9 cooperation with the counties, may also use inmate labor to
10 clean up roads, major water sources, and other water sources
11 around the state.

12 2. On a quarterly basis, the department shall provide
13 a status report regarding private-sector employment to the
14 legislative services agency beginning on July 1, 2020. The
15 report shall include the number of offenders employed in the
16 private sector, the combined number of hours worked by the
17 offenders, the total amount of allowances, and the distribution
18 of allowances pursuant to section 904.702, including any moneys
19 deposited in the general fund of the state.

20 Sec. 8. ELECTRONIC MONITORING REPORT. The department of
21 corrections shall submit a report on electronic monitoring to
22 the general assembly, to the co-chairpersons and the ranking
23 members of the joint appropriations subcommittee on the justice
24 system, and to the legislative services agency by January
25 15, 2021. The report shall specifically address the number
26 of persons being electronically monitored and break down the
27 number of persons being electronically monitored by offense
28 committed. The report shall also include a comparison of any
29 data from the prior fiscal year with the current fiscal year.

30 Sec. 9. STATE AGENCY PURCHASES FROM PRISON INDUSTRIES.

31 1. As used in this section, unless the context otherwise
32 requires, "state agency" means the government of the state
33 of Iowa, including but not limited to all executive branch
34 departments, agencies, boards, bureaus, and commissions, the
35 judicial branch, the general assembly and all legislative

1 agencies, institutions within the purview of the state board of
2 regents, and any corporation whose primary function is to act
3 as an instrumentality of the state.

4 2. State agencies are encouraged to purchase products from
5 Iowa state industries, as defined in section 904.802, when
6 purchases are required and the products are available from
7 Iowa state industries. State agencies shall obtain bids from
8 Iowa state industries for purchases of office furniture during
9 the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2020, exceeding \$5,000 or
10 in accordance with applicable administrative rules related to
11 purchases for the agency.

12 Sec. 10. IOWA LAW ENFORCEMENT ACADEMY.

13 1. There is appropriated from the general fund of the
14 state to the Iowa law enforcement academy for the fiscal year
15 beginning July 1, 2020, and ending June 30, 2021, the following
16 amount, or so much thereof as is necessary, to be used for the
17 purposes designated:

18 a. For salaries, support, maintenance, and miscellaneous
19 purposes, including jailer training and technical assistance:
20 \$ 1,097,475

21 b. The Iowa law enforcement academy may temporarily exceed
22 and draw more than the amount appropriated in this subsection
23 and incur a negative cash balance as long as there are
24 receivables equal to or greater than the negative balance and
25 the amount appropriated in this subsection is not exceeded at
26 the close of the fiscal year.

27 2. The Iowa law enforcement academy may select at least
28 five automobiles of the department of public safety, division
29 of state patrol, prior to turning over the automobiles to
30 the department of administrative services to be disposed
31 of by public auction, and the Iowa law enforcement academy
32 may exchange any automobile owned by the academy for each
33 automobile selected if the selected automobile is used in
34 training law enforcement officers at the academy. However, any
35 automobile exchanged by the academy shall be substituted for

1 the selected vehicle of the department of public safety and
2 sold by public auction with the receipts being deposited in the
3 depreciation fund maintained pursuant to section 8A.365 to the
4 credit of the department of public safety, division of state
5 patrol.

6 3. The Iowa law enforcement academy shall provide training
7 for domestic abuse and human trafficking-related issues
8 throughout the state. The training shall be offered at no
9 cost to the attendees and the training shall not replace any
10 existing domestic abuse or human trafficking training offered
11 by the academy.

12 Sec. 11. STATE PUBLIC DEFENDER. There is appropriated from
13 the general fund of the state to the office of the state public
14 defender of the department of inspections and appeals for the
15 fiscal year beginning July 1, 2020, and ending June 30, 2021,
16 the following amounts, or so much thereof as is necessary, to
17 be used for the purposes designated:

18 1. For salaries, support, maintenance, and miscellaneous
19 purposes:
20 \$ 27,567,078

21 2. For payments on behalf of eligible adults and juveniles
22 from the indigent defense fund, in accordance with section
23 815.11:
24 \$ 42,610,448

25 Sec. 12. BOARD OF PAROLE. There is appropriated from the
26 general fund of the state to the board of parole for the fiscal
27 year beginning July 1, 2020, and ending June 30, 2021, the
28 following amount, or so much thereof as is necessary, to be
29 used for the purposes designated:

30 For salaries, support, maintenance, and miscellaneous
31 purposes:
32 \$ 1,289,135

33 Sec. 13. DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC DEFENSE.

34 1. There is appropriated from the general fund of the
35 state to the department of public defense, for the fiscal year

1 beginning July 1, 2020, and ending June 30, 2021, the following
2 amount, or so much thereof as is necessary, to be used for the
3 purposes designated:

4 For salaries, support, maintenance, and miscellaneous
5 purposes:
6 \$ 6,501,727

7 2. The department of public defense may temporarily exceed
8 and draw more than the amount appropriated in this section and
9 incur a negative cash balance as long as there are receivables
10 of federal funds equal to or greater than the negative balance
11 and the amount appropriated in this section is not exceeded at
12 the close of the fiscal year.

13 Sec. 14. DEPARTMENT OF HOMELAND SECURITY AND EMERGENCY
14 MANAGEMENT.

15 1. There is appropriated from the general fund of the state
16 to the department of homeland security and emergency management
17 for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2020, and ending June 30,
18 2021, the following amount, or so much thereof as is necessary,
19 to be used for the purposes designated:

20 For salaries, support, maintenance, and miscellaneous
21 purposes:
22 \$ 2,139,390

23 2. The department of homeland security and emergency
24 management may temporarily exceed and draw more than the amount
25 appropriated in this section and incur a negative cash balance
26 as long as there are receivables of federal funds equal to or
27 greater than the negative balance and the amount appropriated
28 in this section is not exceeded at the close of the fiscal
29 year.

30 Sec. 15. DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY. There is appropriated
31 from the general fund of the state to the department of public
32 safety for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2020, and ending
33 June 30, 2021, the following amounts, or so much thereof as is
34 necessary, to be used for the purposes designated:

35 1. For administrative functions, including salaries and

1 the adjustment of salaries throughout the department, and the
2 criminal justice information system:

3 \$ 7,059,500

4 2. For the division of criminal investigation, including
5 the state's contribution to the peace officers' retirement,
6 accident, and disability system provided in chapter 97A in the
7 amount of the state's normal contribution rate, as defined
8 in section 97A.8, multiplied by the salaries for which the
9 moneys are appropriated, and to meet federal fund matching
10 requirements:

11 \$ 15,836,217

12 3. For the criminalistics laboratory fund created in
13 section 691.9:

14 \$ 650,000

15 Notwithstanding section 8.33, moneys appropriated in this
16 subsection that remain unencumbered or unobligated at the close
17 of the fiscal year shall not revert but shall remain available
18 for expenditure for the purposes designated until the close of
19 the succeeding fiscal year.

20 4. a. For the division of narcotics enforcement, including
21 the state's contribution to the peace officers' retirement,
22 accident, and disability system provided in chapter 97A in the
23 amount of the state's normal contribution rate, as defined
24 in section 97A.8, multiplied by the salaries for which the
25 moneys are appropriated, and to meet federal fund matching
26 requirements:

27 \$ 8,242,037

28 b. For the division of narcotics enforcement for undercover
29 purchases:

30 \$ 259,042

31 5. For the division of state fire marshal, for fire
32 protection services as provided through the state fire service
33 and emergency response council as created in the department,
34 and for the state's contribution to the peace officers'
35 retirement, accident, and disability system provided in chapter

1 97A in the amount of the state's normal contribution rate, as
2 defined in section 97A.8, multiplied by the salaries for which
3 the moneys are appropriated:

4 \$ 5,317,249

5 6. For the division of state patrol, for salaries, support,
6 maintenance, workers' compensation costs, and miscellaneous
7 purposes, including the state's contribution to the peace
8 officers' retirement, accident, and disability system provided
9 in chapter 97A in the amount of the state's normal contribution
10 rate, as defined in section 97A.8, multiplied by the salaries
11 for which the moneys are appropriated:

12 \$ 67,516,697

13 It is the intent of the general assembly that members of the
14 state patrol be assigned to patrol the highways and roads in
15 lieu of assignments for inspecting school buses for the school
16 districts.

17 7. For deposit in the sick leave benefits fund established
18 in section 80.42 for all departmental employees eligible to
19 receive benefits for accrued sick leave under the collective
20 bargaining agreement:

21 \$ 279,517

22 8. For costs associated with the training and equipment
23 needs of volunteer fire fighters:

24 \$ 825,520

25 Notwithstanding section 8.33, moneys appropriated in this
26 subsection that remain unencumbered or unobligated at the
27 close of the fiscal year shall not revert but shall remain
28 available for expenditure only for the purpose designated in
29 this subsection until the close of the succeeding fiscal year.

30 9. For the public safety interoperable and broadband
31 communications fund established in section 80.44:

32 \$ 115,661

33 10. For the office to combat human trafficking established
34 pursuant to section 80.45, including salaries, support,
35 maintenance, and miscellaneous purposes:

1 \$ 151,974

2 Notwithstanding section 8.39, the department of public
3 safety may reallocate moneys appropriated in this section
4 as necessary to best fulfill the needs provided for in the
5 appropriation. However, the department shall not reallocate
6 moneys appropriated to the department in this section unless
7 notice of the reallocation is given to the legislative services
8 agency and the department of management prior to the effective
9 date of the reallocation. The notice shall include information
10 regarding the rationale for reallocating the moneys. The
11 department shall not reallocate moneys appropriated in this
12 section for the purpose of eliminating any program.

13 Sec. 16. GAMING ENFORCEMENT.

14 1. There is appropriated from the gaming enforcement
15 revolving fund created in section 80.43 to the department of
16 public safety for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2020, and
17 ending June 30, 2021, the following amount, or so much thereof
18 as is necessary, to be used for the purposes designated:

19 For any direct support costs for agents and officers of
20 the division of criminal investigation's excursion gambling
21 boat, gambling structure, and racetrack enclosure enforcement
22 activities, including salaries, support, maintenance, and
23 miscellaneous purposes:

24 \$ 10,797,935

25 2. For each additional license to conduct gambling games on
26 an excursion gambling boat, gambling structure, or racetrack
27 enclosure issued during the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2020,
28 there is appropriated from the gaming enforcement fund to the
29 department of public safety for the fiscal year beginning
30 July 1, 2020, and ending June 30, 2021, an additional amount
31 of not more than \$300,000 to be used for salaries, support,
32 maintenance, and miscellaneous purposes.

35 academy, office of the state public defender, board of parole,

1 Iowa state civil rights commission, and the criminal and
2 juvenile justice planning division of the department of human
3 rights.

4 The bill appropriates moneys from the department of commerce
5 revolving fund for FY 2020-2021 to the office of consumer
6 advocate of the department of justice.

7 The bill appropriates moneys from the gaming enforcement
8 revolving fund for FY 2020-2021 to the department of public
9 safety.

10 The bill appropriates moneys from the 911 emergency
